OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

*** Shelters in outdoor facilities for dogs or cats must contain a roof, four sides, and a floor, and must: Contain clean, dry, bedding material if the ambient temperature is below 50 deg. F (10 deg. C). Additional clean, dry bedding is required when the temperature is 35 deg. F (1.7 deg. C) or lower.***

The outside shelters in the kennel and two hutch units did not contain an adequate of bedding for the current weather conditions. Approximate air temperatures during the inspection was 38 Degrees F. No alternative heat sources were available to the dogs. All houses should have clean dry bedding to the extent of the dog being able to make a nest to conserve body heat. Affects all outside dogs. PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

*** The interior height of a primary enclosure must be at least 6 inches higher than the head of the tallest dog in the enclosure when it is in a normal standing position: Provided That, prior to February 15, 1994, each dog must be able to stand in a comfortable normal position.**

A pug female with litter is housed in the trailer in an enclosure without adequate head space. No more than 4 inches of headspace is available to the pug with the litter of seven puppies. All dogs should have at least 6 inches of head space while in a normal standing position. Affects 1 dog. To be corrected by:01/31/05

CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

*** Used primary enclosures and food and water receptacles for dogs and cats must be sanitized at least once every 2 weeks using one of the methods prescribed in paragraph (b)(3) of this section, and more often if necessary to prevent an accumulation of dirt, debris, food waste, excreta, and other disease hazards.***

At least three enclosures within the trailer require a thorough cleaning to remove accumulations of dirt and debris from the



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sides of the enclosures. These brownish accumulations consist of fecal matter, hair, feed waste, and dirt and contribute to disease hazards. All enclosures should be thoroughly cleaned at least once every two weeks or as often as necessary to prevent accumulations. Affects 19 adult and puppies. To be corrected by:01/28/05

Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors. When steam or water is used to clean the primary enclosure, whether by hosing, flushing, or other methods, dogs and cats must be removed, unless the enclosure is large enough to ensure the animals would not be harmed, wetted, or distressed in the process. Standing water must be removed from the primary enclosure and animals in other primary enclosures must be protected from being contaminated with water and other wastes during the cleaning. The pans under primary enclosures with grill-type floors and the ground areas under raised runs with mesh or slatted floors must be cleaned as often as necessary to prevent accumulation of feces and food waste and to reduce disease hazards pests, insects and odors.

The exercise pen has not been spot cleaned in several days and has an excessive accumulation of fecal waste. The hutch units located within the exercise pen have an excessive accumulation of fecal waste beneath the wire runs. These areas should be spot cleaned to reduce disease and odor hazards. Affects all outside dogs. To be corrected by:01/26/05
