Summary: 2015 Avian Influenza Outbreak.... Lessons Learned Conference

U.S. Poultry and Egg Association in conjunction with the National Chicken Council, the National Turkey Federation, United Egg Producers, USA Poultry & Egg Export Council hosted an "Avian Influenza Outbreak...Lessons Learned" on July 28-29, 2015 in Des Moines, IA. The purpose of the conference was to assist stakeholders in preparing for the potential future exposure to High Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI). Approximately 300 individuals attended in person with an additional 400 participating via webcast.

Presenters included a wide variety of individuals from industry, States, and Veterinary Services. Topics included biosecurity, indemnity, communications, producers' experiences during the outbreak (layers, broilers, turkeys), research updates on vaccination, epidemiology of the virus and disease transmission, depopulation and disposal methods, cleaning and disinfections and repopulation, and trade impacts.

Several major themes emerged from the conference. Some were similar to the themes from the Fall Planning workshop:

- A general consensus that flocks must be depopulated quickly within 24 hours of presumptive diagnosis to effectively prevent further spread of this virus.
- Communications are critical at all levels and appropriate contacts must be established prior to any organized response.
- Emergency response planning is critical as is exercising these response plans.
- Payments for indemnity and cleaning and disinfection need to be streamlined and expedited.
- General recognition that good biosecurity is a critical component to preventing infection. However, it is extremely difficult to prove scientifically which biosecurity efforts are most effective or important. Some facilities with excellent biosecurity and that had passed biosecurity audits still became infected.
- While areas for improvements were mentioned, generally poultry stakeholders were appreciative of APHIS efforts during this outbreak.

Next steps:

- Continue with Fall Planning efforts as previously identified
- Assistant Directors to work with their State counterparts to address gaps identified in the recent survey on State preparedness activities and data regarding depopulation equipment, disposal sites, deployable personnel, and other resources necessary for the fall response.
- Request biosecurity information from industry stateholders within the next two weeks.
