
GOAL 2: Build new collaborations and partnerships while sustaining existing ones

2.1: Improve overall VS collaboration by identifying key relationships and identifying the mutual goals of those relationships



The AVMA defines One Health as...

- *“...the integrative effort of multiple disciplines working locally, nationally, and globally to attain optimal health for people, animals, and the environment...”*



One Health Activities in VS

One Health Activities in VS	Examples
Zoonotic Disease Surveillance	Avian influenza, influenza A in swine, tuberculosis, brucellosis
Epidemiologic Investigations	Q fever, salmonella in hatching chicks
Antimicrobial Resistance	Collaboration among VS, ARS and FSIS to develop the USDA Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) Action Plan; participate in NARMS
Subject Matter Expertise	ANIMAL HEALTH AND HUSBANDRY. RMSF, foodborne outbreaks, risk analyses (avian influenza), Ebola response coordination for livestock
Laboratory Support	PFGE and serotyping for Salmonella outbreaks (live chicks, dog food, etc)

One Health Coordination Center

- Provides One Health Subject Matter Expertise
- Builds Alliances, Coordinates between Partners, and Networks
- Conducts Outreach and Forecasting
- Creates Communication Products About One Health
- Develops and Delivers One Health Training
