

APHIS Strategic Goal 6

- **Protect the health of U.S. agricultural resources, including addressing zoonotic disease issues and incidences, by implementing surveillance, preparedness and response, and control programs.**
 - **6.1:** Monitor the health, including incidences and issues related to zoonotic diseases, of U.S. agricultural resources.
 - **6.2:** Ensure effective preparedness and response systems.
 - **6.3:** Ensure effective control, eradication, management, and enforcement programs.

National List of Reportable Animal Diseases

- Uniform, science- and policy- based, nationally supported standardized list of animal diseases;
- Consistent reporting with uniform case finding and reporting criteria;
- Facilitate national, interstate, and international commerce;
- Assist in meeting international reporting obligations to the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) and trading partners;
- Support the generation of export certifications; contribute to the assessment and reporting of listed zoonotic and endemic animal disease and;
- Facilitate response to an emerging disease or issue in the United States



Committee Deliberation

- Identify zoonotic diseases of concern to you and the stakeholder group you represent and suggest activities related to APHIS' surveillance, preparedness, and response planning.
- Provide a list of zoonotic diseases recommended for inclusion in the NLRAD, surveillance, preparedness and response planning and a justification for including each.
- Recommend a process for VS to receive input from various stakeholders, both traditional (such as animal industry groups) and nontraditional (such as public health, organic farmers, etc), about zoonotic diseases of concern.
