This memo is required to provide an explanation of the procedures causing pain or distress for the animals listed in column E of APHIS Form 7023 for customer number 1415, registration number 43-R-0014 and to describe why pain and/or distress relief was not provided to the 2,837 hamsters so listed. This memo should accompany the Form 7023.

Hamsters are used for federally mandated testing per [REDACTED] (b)(4) [REDACTED] (b)(4) pertaining to [REDACTED] (b)(4). This facilities experience with pain relieving drugs in hamsters indicates no observable safety problems. However the experience shows that use invalidates certain aspects of the test. [REDACTED] (b)(4) [REDACTED] (b)(4) in hamsters is somehow altered in treated animals. The number of [REDACTED] (b)(4) expected at a set time is significantly altered. This in turn alters the expected outcomes and invalidates the test. To date no methodology of pain relief is known to be available that will not change the course of the test. It is pointed out however that in other aspects of hamster testing the use of pain relieving drugs has proved successful. These successes are responsible for a 30% reduction in numbers of hamsters reported in Column E from the 2005 report. The use of pain relieving drugs in guinea pigs has shown continued success.

This institution has and will continue to implement 9 CFR section 117.4 (e) which is to intervene, remove and humanely destroy animals if the illness has progressed to a point when death is expected to occur. In addition to the use of drugs to alleviate pain the facility will continue to practice intervention and where possible provide stress reduction by making postural adjustments and to minimally handle affected animals.

These explanations are adequate and complete as I understand the requirement to explain them. I am hopeful the government agencies responsible for animal use and care oversight and for actual animal testing will share useful information on this matter as both industry and government seek reliable non animal testing systems.
