INSTITUTIONAL ANIMAL CARE AND USE COMMITTEE (IACUC).

Section 2.31(d)(1)(x)(A) IACUC: No animal will be used in more than one major operative procedure from which it is allowed to recover, unless justified for scientific reasons by the principal investigator, in writing.

(1) Animal activity proposal 2002-127 includes two major survival operative procedures that are to be performed on the animals. The principal investigator has not provided in writing the scientific justification for the two major survival operative procedures.

(2) Animal activity proposal 2000-50-3 includes two major survival operative procedures that are to be performed on the animals. The principal investigator has not provided in writing the scientific justification for the two major survival operative procedures.

Correct by July 15, 2005.

Section 2.31(e)(2) IACUC: A proposal to conduct an activity involving animals must contain a rationale for the number of animals used.

Animal activity proposal 2004-219 requested 15 pairs of animals and the rationale for the number of animals was hard to follow. The principal investigator was consulted during the inspection and stated that the rationale for animals given was based on 10 pairs of animals. The rationale for the number of animals needed for the proposal needs to match the number of animals requested for the proposal.

Correct by July 15, 2005.

Section 2.31(e)(3) A proposal to conduct an activity involving animals must include a complete description of the proposed use of the animals.

Animal 1-005 on animal activity proposal 2001-91-3 and animal 4-021 on animal activity proposal 2003-241 were both castrated. This procedure is not included in either proposal. Animal activity proposal must include a complete description of the proposed use of the animal.

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

Section 3.75(c)(2) Maintenance and replacement of surfaces: All surfaces must be maintained on a regular basis. Surfaces of furniture-type fixtures that can not be readily cleaned and sanitized must be replaced when worn or soiled.

In room 5-6426 there was a primate chair with excessively rusty bolts and a plastic panel that was discolored with dissolving paper that was attached to the panel. The rusty bolts need to be replaced and the dissolving paper need to be removed so that the chair can be adequately cleaned and sanitized to maintain the health of the animals.



CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

Section 3.84(c) Housekeeping: Animal facilities shall be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the animals from injury and to facilitate the husbandry practices required in this subpart.

The ceiling of the clean side of the cage wash area is covered with condensation and water is dripping from the ceiling. Water from the ceiling falls on the enclosures after the enclosures are removed from the cage washer. The water from the ceiling can be contaminated with dirt, bacteria, and debris and may adversely affect the health of the animals. The ceiling should not be dripping with moisture.
