Travel Requirements Based on Pet Type

- It is the responsibility of the veterinarian to make sure the pet has met all health requirements of the destination country before issuing a health certificate.
- Failure to meet the requirements may result in problems gaining certificate endorsement or difficulties upon arrival in the destination country.
- Health certificates must be legible, accurate, and complete.

A Health Certificate is required to take your dog from the United Sates into Panama. The Health Certificate must be signed by a USDA Accredited veterinarian and endorsed by USDA APHIS.

After the pet's health certificate is issued by a USDA Accredited veterinarian and endorsed by USDA APHIS, it will need to be stamped and signed by a Panamanian diplomatic office (consulate or embassy) in the United States prior to travel.

 If you live in a state that does not have a Panamanian diplomatic office in it, the health certificate can be signed (apostilled/ legalized) by the Office of Authentications, Bureau of Consular Affairs (U.S. Department of State) located in Washington, D.C. International Health Certificate for Dogs from the U.S. to Panama (184.64 KB)

Note: Panama has updated their import regulations to require that dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies from 3 months of age and that at least 30 days have passed since the first rabies vaccination. Therefore, animals under 4 months of age

are not allowed into the country.

View APHIS Requirements

ALERT: If you're traveling with a dog, be aware that the <u>CDC has additional</u> <u>requirements for bringing a dog into the United States</u>. You must follow CDC's requirements, or your dog will not be allowed to enter the United States.

If you are transiting (passing through) the European Union:



If your pet is traveling through (transiting) a country in the European Union (EU) on the way to a third, non-EU country, you will also need a transit health certificate for your pet for the EU. The transit health certificate will be the same as if your pet's final destination was the EU country. Use the information and steps above under "Travel Requirements Based on Pet Type" to determine which health certificate should be used. <u>View a list of EU countries</u>.
