

Dear Applicant:

Thank you for your interest in obtaining a license from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to conduct activities regulated under the Animal Welfare Act (AWA). As you requested, we have enclosed the appropriate information and forms, including copies of the AWA regulations and standards. As you will note, the different classes for licensing are outlined on Page 2 of the AWA regulations (9CFR, Part 1, Section 1.1). If your operation meets the definition of a Class A, B, or C licenses, please complete the enclosed application (APHIS Form 7003A) and return it to the above address, along with a \$10 check, money order or credit card authorization in payment of the non-refundable application fee. We cannot accept cash payments.

In addition, you must have your veterinarian complete and sign the enclosed program of veterinary care (PVC) form; you must also sign this form. Keep the completed PVC with your facility records, which will be reviewed by your USDA Inspector. Please do not send the completed PVC form to this office.

One of our field inspectors will contact you to schedule a pre-licensing inspection of your facility following receipt of your application and the \$10.00 fee. Once your facility and records are in compliance with all AWA regulations and standards, you will be asked to pay an annual license fee. We will issue a license after all the necessary documentation and inspections have been completed and the necessary fees paid.

The licensing process must be completed within 90 days after your initial pre-license inspection. If, after the initial inspection, your facility is not in compliance with the AWA regulations and standards, you will be allowed two additional inspections within the 90-day period. If you facility is still not in compliance by the 3rd inspection or the 90-day period has elapsed, your application will be denied and you must wait 6 months before reapplying.

Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors. The ground area under the Condo enclosures house approximately 21 animals has an excessive accumulation of feces and waste. There was evidence of insects flying around the accumulation.

The facility has failed to keep an accumulation of feces and waste from under the primary enclosures of 21 animals affecting the husbandry of the animals with unsanitary conditions.

Remove the accumulation of feces and waste from underneath the Condo enclosures.

Correction was started at the time of inspection. This affected 21 animals indirectly.

Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.

There were two injured dogs observed during inspection of the Bread and Butter Barn. There was a Golden Retriever 087-015-350 that had a laceration of the the lower jaw/lip. The area was reddened but not bleeding, however it was apparent that the animal's injury had not been attended to. An American Bulldog 105-370-575 had an injury to the tip of the tail that was still bleeding.

In addition, there were approximately a dozen Golden Retriever dogs and 2 Standard Poodle dogs in the Bread and Butter Barn that had hair coats soiled with feces material.

Animals need to be observed daily to ensure they are healthy, free from injury and clean and groomed. Daily observations of animals ensure that the facility administers required medical attention, sanitation and/or grooming to ensure the health and well being of the animals.

Ensure that all animals are observed daily and provide veterinary care, grooming, sanitation and/or maintenance to the facility and animals based on the daily observations.

Correct immediately. This affected 16 animals indirectly.

Note: The facility brought the 2 animals needing medical attention into the hospital room for veterinary care and the facility began grooming the animals that required grooming at the time of inspection.

The Bread and Butter Barn had an accumulation of wet feces on the inside of the primary enclosures, causing the dogs to become soiled by the feces, with approximately 14 animals being excessively soiled. In addition the primary enclosures in the Big Dog Puppy Barn had an accumulation of hair hanging on the underside of the primary enclosures.

The surfaces that come into contact with the animals need to be kept clean, dry and free from excessive accumulation of hair and/or debris to ensure the animals' comfort and eliminate the potential for disease.

Clean, sanitize and maintain the primary enclosures in the Bread and Butter Barn to ensure that animals are housed in a clean and dry environment. Eliminate the excessive accumulation of hair from underneath the primary enclosures in the Big Dog Puppy Barn.

Correct by: 6 March 2009. This affected approximately 136 animals indirectly.

Note: The facility started pressure washing the Bread and Butter Barn and the Big Dog Puppy Barn at the time of inspection.

SHELTERED HOUSING FACILITIES.

Heating, cooling, and temperature. The sheltered part of sheltered housing facilities for dogs and cats must be sufficiently heated and cooled when necessary to protect the dogs and cats from temperature or humidity extremes and to provide for their health and well-being. The ambient temperature in the sheltered part of the facility must not fall below 50 [deg]F (10 [deg]C) for dogs and cats not acclimated to lower temperatures, for those breeds that cannot tolerate lower temperatures without stress and discomfort (such as short-haired breeds), and for sick, aged, young, or infirm dogs or cats, except as approved by the attending veterinarian. Dry bedding, solid resting boards, or other methods of conserving body heat must be provided when temperatures are below 50 [deg]F (10 [deg]C). The ambient temperature must not fall below 45 [deg]F (7.2 [deg]C) for more than 4 consecutive hours when dogs or cats are present, and must not rise above 85 [deg]F (29.5 [deg]C) for more than 4 consecutive hours when dogs or cats are present. The preceding requirements are in addition to, not in place of, all other requirements pertaining to climatic conditions in parts 2 and 3 of this chapter.

The "Husky barn" is a sheltered facility. The sheltered portion of the barn had temperature readings around 23.8 degrees at the time of inspection. There was also ice present in most of the water buckets. It was apparent that the

The sheltered portion of sheltered housing needs to provide enough heat to ensure the comfort of animals and to ensure their health and wellbeing.

Ensure the temperature of the "Husky barn" sheltered facility does not fall below 45 deg F for more than 4 hours when housing animals.

All animals in this barn were moved to other compliant sheltered and outdoor housing at the time of inspection. This affected approximately 41 animals indirectly.

3.4 (a) (1) (i)

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

Restrictions. The following categories of dogs or cats must not be kept in outdoor facilities, unless that practice is specifically approved by the attending veterinarian:

Dogs or cats that are not acclimated to the temperatures prevalent in the area or region where they are maintained;

The facility had 19 young bulldogs (16 weeks of age) moved to outdoor pens that had not been acclimated to the cold temperatures. The young animals were noticeably shivering at times during observation. The outside temperature as read by the kestral was averaging 12.1 deg F at the time of inspection.

Young, short breed dogs must be acclimated to extreme temperatures and have approval of the attending veterinarian prior to housing in outdoor facilities. This ensures the comfort and the health and wellbeing of the animals.

The animals were moved to compliant indoor housing at the time of inspection. This affected 19 animals indirectly.

the Program of Veterinary Care, an American Bulldog with facial lacerations, a seizing Pekingese that later died, an emaciated English Springer with a runny nose and a crusty left eye, a Pug with a corneal condition of the right eye that was later euthanized by an unapproved method, an English Bulldog with an approximately 2.5 x swollen left rear leg and a swollen left ear from a possible dog fight 5-6 days previously, and a Shih Tzu that had an eye nucleation that was later euthanized by an unapproved method.

The facility does not have an effective means in place for communicating with the attending veterinarian accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being to the attending veterinarian. In addition, animal health conditions are being missed on the daily observations of animals or daily observations of all animals is not being done. The facility is not documenting that adequate veterinary care is being provided and have deviated from the approved method euthanasia documented on the Program of Veterinary Care. All these items contributed to the suffering of several animals.

The facility's lack of adequate veterinary care is affecting the health and wellbeing of the animals and can potentially lead to animal suffering.

Provide an effective approved Program of Veterinary Care in place that is followed and documented, document communications to and from the Attending Veterinarian, provide adequate veterinary care and use only approved methods of euthanasia to relieve animal suffering.

Correct immediately. This affected approximately 13 animals directly.

PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

Have floors that are constructed in a manner that protects the dogs' and cats' feet and legs from injury, and that, if of mesh or slatted construction, do not allow the dogs' and cats' feet to pass through any openings in the floor.

There was one pen in the whelping barn containing 9 puppies where the feet were going through the flooring.

Puppies not having flooring that supports their footing can potentially injure themselves if their feet pass through the flooring. This affects their health and wellbeing.

Owner Charged For Horrific Puppy Mill Conditions

CHICAGO (CBS) — There are deplorable conditions inside a puppy mill that supplies thousands of dogs to pet stores and Internet buyers across the country, including Chicago. CBS 2 Investigator Pam Zekman reports that an exclusive videotape was recorded in Minnesota by an investigator for the Companion Animal Protection Society, called CAPS.

It's a not-for-profit organization that focuses on exposing abusive conditions in pet stores and puppy mills.

As a breeder operating Pick of the Litter, Kathy Bauck is supposed to comply with all U.S. Department of Agriculture regulations. But she doesn't.

For example, puppies' paws slip through openings in their cage floor. Bauck was cited for this in 2006. The USDA said it "could potentially cause injury to the legs," and to "correct immediately."

But Bauck told her staff to only use mats when inspectors are around.

"And the minute she leaves, we pull them up," Bauck said.

Bauck has also been cited for failing to provide "adequate veterinary care" and to "correct immediately."

But the CAPS investigator saw emaciated pregnant mothers, sick puppies, dogs suffering

from serious infections and open wounds.

"I just can't hardly sew it up," Bauck said. "It's going to have to heal."

CBS 2 showed the undercover video to an expert.

"There's no question in my mind that this should have gone to a veterinarian and been surgically repaired. That's a huge wound," said Dr. Sheldon Rubin, DVM, Pres., Ill. Veterinary Medical Association.

Deborah Howard heads the Companion Animal Protection Society.

"We receive probably more complaints about her dogs than just about any other breeder or broker in this country," Howard said.

Like the complaint from Brian O'Keefe and his mother Christa. They paid \$3,200 for one of Bauck's bulldogs at a Petland store in Niles.

"They guaranteed me a healthy dog," Brian said.

But Samson came home lethargic, urinating blood and required several surgeries, including two for a condition called cherry eyes.

"We're still out \$5,500 in medical bills," Christa said.

Then there's Tegan. It took months for her to recover from kennel cough and intestinal parasites after Peggy Lockrey bought the sheltie from Park Pet Shop in Chicago.

"They claimed they went to a very reputable breeder," Lockrey said.

Now Kathy Bauck has been charged with animal cruelty, torture, and unlicensed practice of veterinary medicine.

Among the examples cited, a bulldog with infected gashes in its cheeks. Bauck told the CAPS investigator how to treat the infection.

"All you guys have to do is put a little Clorox water on it," Bauck said.

Experts say that will make the condition worse.

"Clorox is damaging to tissue," Dr. Rubin said.

Another example: dunking dogs in a tub of diluted insecticide normally used for livestock.

The label lists the hazards to humans and domestic animals: "irreversible eye damage," "may be fatal if swallowed," "harmful if absorbed through skin."

"Look, the dog is licking it," Dr. Rubin said. "These are insecticides that are toxic to dogs."

And then there was a bishon who had trouble delivering her puppies.

" and her daughter used forceps or clamps to reach in and try to pull this puppy out of there," Howard said. "She broke off the tail, and broke off one of its rear legs."

For days, the mother laid in her cage, unable to stand on her own – then died.

"There are dogs dying there on a regular basis," Howard said. "Litters of puppies that just die, just like that."

Bauck is still in business. But first the Petland chain and later both pet stores in this report stopped doing business with her. Petland gave the O'Keefe's a refund.

Bauck's attorney says her facility is clean and animals are treated with compassion and care. He said she does consult with a veterinarian. And he charges that the CAPS investigator created situations to portray bad conditions and fabricated evidence.



USDA Considering Action Against Puppy Mill Owner

CHICAGO (CBS) — The U.S. Department of Agriculture is considering taking action to shut down a bad breeder that supplies dogs to pet stores here and across the country.

The 2 Investigators' story Thursday night included videotaped evidence of shocking conditions recorded by an undercover investigator for the Companion Animal Protection Society (CAPS).

CBS 2 Investigator Pam Zekman reports the USDA is reviewing all of the CAPS tape and the breeder Kathy Bauck's troubled history.

It is routine practice for Bauck, who owns Pick of the Litter in Minnesota, to dunk her dogs in a tub of water diluted with a toxic insecticide meant for swine. It can damage a dog's eyes and could be fatal if swallowed.

Records show Bauck's routine has also included practicing veterinary medicine without a license, including botching surgeries on dogs.

"We kept getting reports that she was doing c-sections and spay and neuters and docking tails and cropping ears and giving vaccines and other kinds of medications," said Deborah Howard of the Companion Animal Protection Society.

In 2006 Bauck was ordered by the Minnesota Board of Veterinary Medicine to cease and desist the unlicensed practice of veterinary medicine. But she didn't.

So last April, Bauck faced similar criminal charges, pleaded guilty to one count and was jailed for five nights.

Video shot by the CAPS investigator has led to animal cruelty charges against her. It shows emaciated dogs, wounded dogs, and sick dogs all in need of a real veterinary care.

"My heart is bleeding for these animals," said Dr. Sheldon Rubin of Blum Animal Hospital.

The 2 Investigators showed the tape Dr. Rubin, who is president of the Illinois Veterinary Medical Association.

"We are going to try to get these puppy mills shut down all over the United States," Rubin said. "I don't mean just here."

Viewers have asked about the dogs in Thursday night's report. Some died. And records show Bauck euthanized others using a method that is not approved by the USDA.

Bauck has pleaded not guilty to all of the charges. Her lawyer says the CAPS investigator created evidence and stole records that showed she had consulted with a veterinarian about the sick dogs as required by the USDA.

In August, a month after she was charged, the USDA found no violations at Bauck's farm.

congressional oversight hearings are an absolute necessity.

CAPS and its pro bono lobbyists have been meeting with members of congress to present the findings from our investigations of numerous USDA licensed facilities. CAPS is requesting oversight hearings on the USDA's failure to enforce the AWA, advocating changes to the AWA and recommending new policies regarding the actions of USDA inspectors.

To keep building our case against the USDA and its failure to enforce the AWA, CAPS' evidentiary findings must stay current. We must demonstrate that this disregard of the AWA is pervasive throughout USDA's AHPS/Animal Care and not just a question of a few bad inspectors. Thus, it is essential that CAPS continue its in-depth investigations of USDA licensed facilities. Investigations - we also rescue puppy mill dogs as evidence of the cruelties being committed at these facilities - are costly.

Below is a white paper prepared by Crowell & Moring, CAPS' pro bono lobbyists in Washington DC. It outlines CAPS concerns about the USDA's failure to enforce the Animal Welfare Act and lists some suggested solutions. We provide this white paper (with attached Poor, Lorton and Wee investigation reports) to congressional aides prior to meeting with them.

The Animal Welfare Act Needs Strengthening and the USDA's Administration of the Act Must be Overhauled.

As the only national organization dedicated exclusively to protecting companion animals, the Companion Animal Protection Society (CAPS) is committed to ending the abuse and suffering of puppy mill dogs. Since 1995, CAPS has investigated over 100 puppy mills, with our most recent puppy mill investigations having been conducted in Minnesota, Illinois, Missouri, and Iowa. Further, CAPS works closely with the media, and has generated stories with "Dateline," "20/20," "Hardcopy," and magazines such as *Life*, *People*, and the *Readers' Digest*, as well as television stations in Boston, Chicago, and elsewhere.

Based on our years of investigative experience, CAPS has concluded that although the Animal Welfare Act (AWA) gives the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) the power to license, inspect and regulate breeders and brokers who deal in dogs for commercial purposes, the USDA's implementation of AWA has been grievously insufficient - fulfilling neither the letter nor the intent of the AWA.

Sadly, the problems we have identified are not new. In a March 1992 report, the USDA's independent Office of Inspector General (OIG) found that the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) could not ensure the humane care and treatment of animals as required by the AWA. Indeed, in a subsequent January 1995 report, the OIG, recommended new legislation to strengthen and enhance APHIS' authority.

CAPS believes strongly that the time has come to fix these problems once and for all, and we urge the Congress to take the actions necessary - including oversight of the USDA's activities and enactment of remedial legislation - to achieve this goal. A brief summary of our concerns and some suggested solutions are set forth below.

Summary of Concerns

Importantly, although some improvements in the USDA's regulations are warranted, the larger problem is that the USDA is simply not enforcing them adequately. The USDA's rules (see generally, 9 CFR Parts 1-4), are too often ignored, not only by those who are regulated, but also by the regulators



One at a Time
A Week in an American Animal Shelter



This compelling book brings the tragic issue of unwanted companion animals vividly to life via a true account of seven days in a typical U.S. animal shelter. Thus, although the USDA's rules establish fundamental standards intended to provide for the humane care and treatment of dogs and other animals, unfortunately, as CAPS finds repeatedly in our field investigations, the standards for housing, ventilation, lighting, interior surfaces, primary enclosures, sanitation, pest controls, feeding and watering, outside shelter, compatibility, adequate veterinary care, and handling are, in all too many cases, being ignored. Complete copies of our field investigations are available upon request. Simply put either through omission, misfeasance, and (we fear) in some cases, even malfeasance, the USDA is not getting the job done. CAPS urges Congress to act swiftly to remedy the systemic failures we have identified.

Suggested Solutions

We question whether the USDA is even institutionally capable of adequately implementing the puppy mill protection provisions of the AWA. Thus, we believe the appropriate congressional committees should conduct prompt and vigorous oversight of the USDA's management of this program with the following questions in mind:

- Does APHIS have sufficient funding and personnel to carry out its statutory mission?
- Does APHIS have the requisite management and training structures in place to fulfill its mission?
- Are APHIS inspectors qualified and properly trained to do the job?
In addition, and at a minimum, the Congress should strengthen the AWA to:
- require mandatory semiannual unannounced inspections of each licensee's facility, and mandatory reinspections, within thirty days, of any facilities where violations of USDA's standards and regulations have been found, to ensure they are corrected in a timely fashion;
- require mandatory unannounced inspections of facilities at which licenses are not renewed by the licensee no later than two months from the expiration date of such license;
- punish through imprisonment or fine (or both) any person who gives advance notice of any unannounced AWA inspection;
- provide a mechanism to allow representatives of animal welfare organizations to file written complaints regarding licensed facilities, including the right of such representatives to accompany APHIS inspectors as they inspect licensees' facilities in response to such complaints;
- require mandatory suspension of dealer licenses if cited violations of USDA's standards have not been corrected in a timely fashion;
- require mandatory revocation of dealer licenses if the dealer is found to be in serious violation of AWA regulations or standards (e.g., lack of food or water, adequate veterinary care) during any three mandatory inspections (See S. 1478/H.R. 3058, the Puppy Protection Act of 2001);
- provide for mandatory unannounced inspections of facilities at which licenses are suspended or revoked, within two weeks of such suspension or revocation, to ensure that dogs are not being sold; and
- prohibit the use of gunshot as a form of euthanasia, the conduct of Cesarean sections by anyone other than a licensed veterinarian, and the weaning of animals before six weeks of age.

CAPS believe that prompt and vigorous congressional oversight of the USDA and strengthening of the AWA, as outlined above are essential. CAPS is working to achieve these goals.

Please write the following USDA officials and ask them to enforce the Animal Welfare Act as it pertains to federally licensed dog breeding and brokering facilities and to implement the above solutions suggested by CAPS.

Attorney: Animal cruelty charges should be dropped

If Zenas Baer has his way, animal abuse charges pending against a New York Mills, Minn., dog breeder will go away.

"The charges are based on self-serving information," the defense attorney said Monday as he left a hearing in Otter Tail County District Court for Kathy Bauck.

Bauck faces five counts of cruelty to animals, two counts of torture and two counts of practicing veterinary medicine without a license.

The charges stem from claims made by an animal welfare advocate who, among other things, told authorities he saw Bauck pull the leg off a puppy during a difficult birthing when he worked at Bauck's kennel, Pick of the Litter, earlier this year.

Baer, who has described the episode as an attempt to save the life of a puppy that was otherwise certain to die, has filed papers asking that all charges be dismissed.

Bauck, who is a licensed breeder with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, was found to be in noncompliance with her license after USDA inspections in 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007, according to records obtained through the Freedom of Information Act.

In the pending court case, Jason Smith, a member of the Companion Animal Protection Society, a Massachusetts-based nonprofit, went to the Otter Tail County Sheriff's Department in May, according to a court complaint.

Smith claimed Bauck was mistreating animals, including submerging dogs in a tub filled with an insecticide called ProLafe/Lintox, which according to the complaint is supposed to be used on cattle and swine.

"Animals are not to be submerged in this kind of solution. The young and the immune-suppressed are more likely to get toxic exposure," the complaint states.

Baer told Judge Wally Senyk the charges are not proper and are causing Bauck's business, which she has operated for more than 20 years, great hardship because potential buyers will not do business with her while the case is pending.

In recent years, the kennel purchased between 800 and 1,000 animals annually and sold between 3,000 and 4,000 animals a year, according to USDA documents.

Baer said if the Otter Tail County charges are not dismissed, he wants the judge to suppress any evidence acquired through "law enforcement using Smith as a clandestine undercover officer," including video Smith shot at the kennel.

Senyk is expected to rule on the requests on Oct. 9.

Also at issue is a case from earlier this year when Bauck entered a guilty plea to one count of practicing veterinary medicine without a license.

In that case, Bauck was sentenced to 120 days in jail with 110 days stayed on condition she have no similar violations. Prosecutors have asked the court to impose the remaining jail time.

Dog breeder seeks to have charges dropped

The attorney representing a New York Mills woman accused of animal abuse is asking that the charges against his client be dismissed.

Kathy Bauck, 52, owner of Pick of the Litter Kennels, has been charged with multiple counts of animal cruelty, torture and practicing veterinary medicine without a license in July. The allegations against Bauck come from an animal advocate and former employee, Jason Smith, who joined Pick of the Litter Kennels in mid-April of this year.

By mid-May, Smith had contacted Otter Tail County authorities regarding poor veterinary practices and outright abuse he said he witnessed at work. According to court records, Smith had documentation of dogs being dipped into a chemical mixture intended for cattle and swine. He also documented a difficult birth in which some dogs were delivered dead and the female was not treated by a veterinarian.

On Friday, Bauck's attorney, Zenas Baer, filed a motion to dismiss the charges altogether, citing lack of probable cause.

In a court hearing Monday Baer said the charges against Bauck are based on self-serving information from Jason Smith. Smith's goal, Baer said, was "to shut down an otherwise longstanding, responsible business in the community."

According to Baer, Smith is part of the Companion Animal Protection Society (CAPS). This group describes itself as a national animal welfare organization promoting the ethical treatment of companion animals by commercial breeders. CAPS also claims its members have investigated over 1,000 commercial breeding facilities in 16 states since 1995.

If the charges are not dropped, Baer would like the Otter Tail County District Court to suppress all secretly-obtained evidence collected by Smith during the time he worked at Pick of the Litter Kennels. This includes 10 to 12 hours of audio and video footage of Smith working in barns, as well as written summaries of each day's activities.

Baer argues that as of May 13, when Smith met with Det. Keith Van Dyke of the Otter Tail County Sheriff's Office, Smith became an extension of law enforcement. Smith then proceeded to investigate Bauck's property without a warrant, violating her Fourth Amendment rights.

Baer also said he believes Smith created evidence against his client. Furthermore, he said, if any abuse had taken place on Bauck's property, Smith would have been required by law to remove animals from the site, which he did not.

Yet Smith is not the only employee to raise questions about Bauck's conduct. According to court records, sheriff's personnel spoke with a juvenile employee in August who had worked at Pick of the Litter Kennels for over a year. The employee claimed to have witnessed Bauck euthanize five dogs by use of a large wooden box connected to the exhaust system of an ATV. The employee also said she had seen Bauck performing hernia and neutering operations on dogs in which the employee believed no anesthesia was used. These operations were also alleged to have been performed on a table in the employee break room.

Smith's accusations against Bauck have put the breeder at "a significant economic disadvantage," Baer told Otter Tail County District Court Judge Wally Senyk Monday.

As long as the charges are pending, Baer said, Bauck's clients as far away as the East Coast will not buy from her.

Senyk will rule on Baer's motion Oct. 9.
