*** Several bottles were found in the kennel containing different medications than those listed on the bottle. The licensee stated that one bottle contained Pepto Bismol and one bottle contained de-wormer. These bottles were not properly labeled to insure the medications are known and they are within date of expiration. To correct this, properly label all bottles containing medication to be used on the dogs.

*** Several old single prescription bottles were found in the kennel. These prescription bottles are intended for single use and should be discarded after use to insure safe and effective drug administration for all dogs in the kennel. Correct this by using appropriate drugs on the dogs and discarding unused drugs afterwards.

(3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.

*** Two dogs were found in the kennel with excessively long nails. These were a female brindle and white bulldog (chip number 062775098) and a black female French bulldog. These are a potential hazard to the dogs if they were to get caught in the coated metal wire. Correct this by trimming and maintaining these and all nails on the dogs.

TIME AND METHOD OF IDENTIFICATION.

(2) Live puppies or kittens, less than 16 weeks of age, shall be identified by:

(i) An official tag as described in Sec. 2.51;

(ii) A distinctive and legible tattoo marking approved by the Administrator; or

(iii) A plastic-type collar acceptable to the Administrator which has legibly placed thereon the information required for an official tag pursuant to Sec. 2.51.

*** All of the weaned puppies have no ID number on their cage cards. The licensee is using cage cards to identify the pups and is listing date of birth, dam, and sire but not listing individual puppies. This is required to ensure the tracking of all animals in the facility is possible. This is especially important in the event of a disease outbreak. Correct this by assigning each individual puppy a number and placing them on the cage cards.

Correct by: 15 JUN 08 for puppies on hand and for all future births.

RECORDS: DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS.

(a)(1) Each dealer, other than operators of auction sales and brokers to whom animals are consigned, and each exhibitor shall make, keep, and maintain records or forms which fully and correctly disclose the following information concerning each dog or cat purchased or otherwise acquired, owned, held, or otherwise in his or her possession or under his or her control, or which is transported, euthanized, sold, or otherwise disposed of by that dealer or exhibitor.

*** The Form 7005 on hand only lists 62 adult dogs. The physical inspection conducted counted 88 adult dogs. The licensee stated that there are several young stock animals that have not been added to the Form 7005. These dogs are required to be listed on the Form 7005 with all information to ensure animal tracking is possible. Correct this by ensuring all animals are listed on the Form 7005.

*** Additionally, there are 8 dogs listed on the Form 7005 that do not have ID numbers listed. The licensee is using microchips for ID purposes. These dogs need to have their chip numbers added to ensure proper tracking is possible.



** The main kennel barn has a trash container without a lid. This is required to decrease the potential for pest infestation. Correct this by placing a lid on this container.

CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors.

*** The washdowns for the center enclosure in the main kennel are difficult to clean due to their construction. The enclosures are made of coated metal wire and the washdowns lie immediately under them. Much of the washdown is rusted and in need of replacement. The licensee is planning to completely remodel this area and has reduced the number of dogs in this area. Several areas of the washdown have fecal staining, caked old feed, and feces. This areas needs to be cleaned to reduce disease hazards and odors in the kennel.

*** One enclosure housing large breed dogs has a dirty doggy door. This door has dirt and grime on it from the dogs opening it with their noses. The walls of this enclosure are also dirty and need to be cleaned. The licensee stated that this enclosure has been cleaned within the last few days. The licensee has improved the cleaning in this facility significantly but needs to continue to improve to get this item fully in compliance. All surfaces in contact with the dogs must be spot cleaned daily to ensure the dogs have a clean environment and to reduce disease hazards. Correct this by cleaning all surfaces in contact with the dogs daily.



™ The main kennel food/medication storage area needs to be cleaned and straightened. This area has various items being used for other than husbandry purposes that need to be removed. This inhibits normal husbandry practices. Correct this by keeping this area neat and clean. The licensee has improved this area since the last inspection on June 10, 2008 but additional work is required to correct this problem.

*** Rodent feces were found in the food/medication storage area around the pallets used to store feed. Also, one live mouse was seen running in one corner of the same room. The licensee stated he does use rodent pest control. One packet of rodent control bait was found in this area. This pest control needs to be improved. This is important to ensure a safe food supply for the dogs and to reduce potential disease hazards from these rodents. Correct this by improving pest control practices.

PRIMARY ENCLOSURES

(iii) The interior height of a primary enclosure must be at least 6 inches higher than the head of the tallest dog in the enclosure when it is in a normal standing position.

***One female Kerri Blue Terrier was found in a primary enclosure that did not have enough head space. The dog was not able to stand erect in the enclosure because the enclosure was too short. This dog needs to be moved to a taller enclosure to ensure it has adequate head room. Lack of sufficient space can lead to additional stress on the animal. Correct this by providing additional room to this dog.

ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

Section 2.40(a) - Adequate veterinary care. Each dealer or exhibitor shall have an attending veterinarian to provide adequate veterinary care to their animals.

- there is one doxin that is extremely thin, with all the skeletal bones close to the surface, prevalent, skin lesions and hair loss, in the 2nd pen on the south side of the old garage,
- in the 3rd pen there is one doxin, one IG and one Chihuahua that are extremely thin.
- The next enclosure has 4 doxin, three are extremely thin, with rib cage, dorsal spinous processes of the back and the pin bones of the hips evident and eating on a dead dog that was in with them, one long haired doxin, seems very lethargic, she doesn't respond to our call or come to the fence to see us like the others.
- The last enclosure that's next to the old barn has one dapple and two red doxin that are extremely thin with rib cage, dorsal spinous processes of the back and the pin bones of the hips evident.
- In the first row starting from the west end, in the 1st enclosure, a female basset has a large mass below its left foreleg, hanging from the chest area, where the first mammae would be
- There is a white IG and a blue IG that have skin lesions in cage #3 of the 1st row
- In the second row, starting from the west end, cage #5 there are 4 Doxins, one is lethargic and a red and spotted are very thin.
- In that same row, cage 11 has one IG and one Shih-tzu that are both very thin.
- the last enclosure in that row has a male pug with a deviated lower jaw (appears to be an old injury), which needs to be examined to determine whether it interferes with the animals ability to eat or if the dog needs to receive a special diet.
- In row #3 starting at the east end, cage #2 had one very thin IG and two dead IG's in one of the dog houses.
- In that same row cage #5 had 4 IG's, two were extremely thin, shaking, sitting and walking hunched up, dorsal processes and pin bones were prominently evident. They spent the majority of their time sitting in one small ray of sunlight, or sitting in the dog house, without any bedding. The overnight temperatures, last night were in the middle to lower thirties, the temperature at this time is 64°F, with the animals still showing a core temperature deficit (as evidenced by their shivering and hunched up body positions), tonight's low 30's temperature will cause a great deal of suffering.
- In the 4th row counting from the east, pen one has a black Pom that spent all the time laying in the dog house just looking at us.
- Behind the rows of cages was a small mixed breed pup that was dead and further out another loose pup was chewing on the remains of a crested hairless chihuahua.
- under the 3 sided shed in the 1st pen starting from the west was a pen of 8 Shih-Tzu's, one of which was stand offish and seemed fearful of the other dogs and at least two of those dogs were loosing hair.
- in the 2nd pen starting from the west was a pen of 9 Shih-Tzu's that all had various amounts of hair loss and were scratching. All of the above dogs should be evaluated by the veterinarian to determine why these animals are so thin. Sixteen of the above dogs need to be taken to the veterinarian no later than the morning of 11/8/07 for immediate evaluation and treatment. The owner states that they are all being fed, so a complete work up on the dogs will be necessary, to determine why they are so

- The fox terriers, several of the cairn terriers and three of the animals identified as needing to go to the vet, were not identified by means of a collar, tattoo or microchip. All of the animals on hand should be identified by the same manner.

- approximately 10 to 20 feral dogs are running loose and having puppies. Since some these are females and reproducing, they must be considered part of the kennel and put in enclosures, or must be separated from the kennel and fenced in and all the females spayed or records kept on what is done with the off spring. Correct by: 1/01/08

Section 3.1 (c)(3) - Cleaning. Surfaces in which dogs and cats come in contact must be spot cleaned daily and sanitized a minimum of every 2 weeks, or more often if necessary.

- There are 193 dogs out side, not one dog had a clean house, clean food bowls or clean water bowls. There was a lot of caked mud and some gravel in the houses, food and water bowls. The houses, food and water containers need to be sanitized as often as necessary to keep them clean. Correct by: 11/14/07

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

Section 3.4(b)(2) - Dogs and cats must be provided with protection from the direct rays of the sun, and the direct effect of wind, rain, or snow.

- one enclosure in the 4th row had a portion of the tarp, used for shade, hanging down in the enclosure. Two enclosures in the 2nd row also had tarps that were ripped. The tarp should be repaired or replaced so that the houses below the tarp will be protected from the wind and rain. Tarps over pens 6,7,8,9 in the 3 row of cages, have torn tarps which need repair or replaced. Tarps over cages 1 & 2 in the 4th row.

Section 3.4(b)(4) - Shelter in outdoor facilities for dogs and cats must contain clean, dry, bedding material if the ambient temperature is below 50 degrees F. Additional clean, dry bedding is required when the ambient temperature is 35 degrees F or lower.

- None of the dog houses, which provided shelter for 191 dogs, had any bedding or any signs of bedding having been there previously. None of the houses provided an alternate source of heat, such as heat lamps or heating pads. Of the 191 dogs in the outside portion of the kennel, 56 were slick haired or had no hair at all, 32 dogs were short haired. The temperature in the afternoon was 64°F, night time temperatures were in the lower 30's. The dogs will be cold going into this evenings, even colder temperatures. All of the slick haired and hairless dogs need to be kept indoors, they are breeds that do not acclimate to cold temperatures. Twelve dogs were brought inside the house on 11/7/07. Bedding was placed in 15 enclosures on 11/8/07, this affected 53 dogs.

- Inside the house, one enclosure, with a maltese had the wiring torn loose from the side wall, and another enclosure with fox terrier pups, had the flooring torn up, both had sharp pointed wire sticking into the enclosure, where it could injure the dogs.

Section 3.6 (a)(2)(viii) - Primary enclosures for dogs and cats must provide all animals with easy and convenient access to clean food and water.

- there was no food available in the enclosures, many had empty feeders, others had individual feed bowls, but with the number of animals in many of those enclosures, there were not enough food bowls to keep the dogs from fighting for their food and none of them were clean. (191 dogs affected) Correct by: 11/14/07

Section 3.6(c) - Primary enclosures for dogs and cats must provide a minimum amount of floor space as set forth in this section.

- the small bank of 6 cages in the middle room had a pug, an IG, a shih-tzu that were in cages that were 20"x20"x14", there was one other dog with each of them, the cages were too small and too short. The dogs should be moved to more appropriate enclosures.

3.7 (b)

COMPATIBLE GROUPING.

Section 3.7(b) - Compatible group. Dogs and cats housed in the same enclosure must be compatible.

- There was one dead dog in one enclosure and lesions on two other dogs in another enclosure, along with sparing between individuals during the inspection, that indicate that many groups are not compatible. Aggressive dogs should be separated to reduce fighting and the potential for injury. Correct by: 11/14/07

- at least 20 dogs are very thin with another 16 that are extremely thin, with very little, if any body fat. Several of these dogs were exhibiting signs of being cold, like shivering, walking hunched up, sitting in the sun, or running to the dog house, even though the temperature was in the middle 60's. Many of the other dogs have very poor hair coats and others have hair loss. There was little to no fecal material in the enclosures. The dogs are not receiving a sufficient quantity of nutritive food source. On 11/7/07 food had apparently been offered to the dogs, several pens had runny stools.

- a number of dogs are loose and have access to the dogs in the kennels, there is a potential for the spread of fleas and ticks as well as disease. The dogs need to become part of the kennel or removed from the facility and a fence placed around the outside kennels to protect them from other unwanted animals from coming up to them. As a reminder, you should file your application for renewal and pay your licensing fees on or before the expiration date each year. We will send you a renewal notice again next year about 60 days before the expiration date of your license. If you cease conducting regulated activities, you may cancel your license at any time by notifying us, in writing, that you wish to terminate your license.

The law also requires that you notify us, by certified mail, of any change in the name, address, location, management and control or ownership of your business within 10 days after such a change has occurred.

Please be advised that your facility records must be kept current and they are subject to review by APHIS Officials during compliance inspections. You may order record keeping forms from this office free of charge.
