**Details of Complaint:** Neglect & abuse of chimpanzees. In 10 mos. Except for Kenzy for when he's working, 2 older chimps Hanna & Kenzy) have never gotten exercise or seen sunlight because they are kept in travel cages in the dark 24/7. The baby, Bentley, gets out limited time but gets no play time or exercise. He is usually confined to "baby crib" that has a top that locks him in where he can't stand up. Sometimes confined for 18 hrs at a time w/o supervision and, at times, he is so covered in urine/feces he has to be bathed immediately when Mr. Casey returns. Mr. Casey has physically beaten Kenzy with a fist to top of head, extremely hard arm jerk and use of a stick to discipline him. Kenzy & Hanna severely disciplined for talking or yelling from their cages by not feeding them, keeping them in the dark trailer, yelling at them, hitting the cages and/or throwing hot water on them. Mr. Casey is evading getting licensed in Nevada.

**Results:** I visited the complainant on the morning of 12/27/2010. We discussed the details of his complaint and he stated that he stands by each part of his complaint and can give names of others that could do the same. When I mentioned that the A/C program had no definitions for neglect and abuse he started to become agitated until I told him that he described what he meant by neglect and abuse rather well in his letter to Ft. Collins.

The same afternoon I visited Mr. Casey at the address he has given as temporary for Las Vegas. I measured each space provided to the chimps inside the vehicle used to give them shelter when not being exercised or provided daylight and fresh air. Through my conversation with Mr. Casey I have concluded that he has used his hand in a fist to hit Kenzy for misbehavior and has thrown hot water from a cup of tea at either Kenzy or Hanna for the same. Mr. Casey also has another problem that he needs to address and that is he needs someone to care for his animals that he leaves at his home site when he leaves with another animal for a working engagement. At this point he has been leaving those duties to his girlfriend/fiancé that admits has no past experience or training with exotics, specifically chimpanzees. On 1/27/2011 an A/C VMO and I attempted an unannounced inspection. Mr. Casey was not in Town and wouldn't return for hours later. There has been another official complaint on Mr. Casey filed with the Regional office that will be answered at a later date.

A more comprehensive report of my efforts with Mr. Casey and this complaint has been sent to the asst. Regional director via e-mail. I have also reported my SACS as necessary.

#### HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(a) Structure: construction. Housing facilities for nonhuman primates must be designed and constructed so that they are structurally sound for the species of nonhuman primates housed in them. They must be kept in good repair, and they must protect the animals from injury, contain the animals securely, and restrict other animals from entering. The outdoor enclosures at this location are old enclosures that had been used to contain large felids. The enclosure itself is constructed of steel pipe and chain link fencing. The gates being used are built into the sides of the enclosure. The enclosure is rather large measuring 20.5 feet wide x 65 feet long x 7.5 feet high. There are no partitions inside of the enclosure for separation if needed. The main concern is that there is a horizontal pipe close to ground level that is high enough where the youngest of the three chimps, "Bentley" could easily get his head stuck between the pipe and the ground and not recover. In addition, should the capuchin escape the enclosure meant for it's use that animal will easily get out of the larger of the two just as well. The licensee can correct the problem by making the areas under the horizontal pipe secure around the entire perimeter of the enclosure so the animals are contained at all times when they occupy this structure. Note: The younger chimp "Bentley" was seen with his head and one shoulder under the horizontal pipe mentioned above.

#### CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from inside each indoor primary enclosure daily and from underneath them as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent the nonhuman primates from becoming soiled, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests, and odors. Floors with absorbent bedding ... must be spot-cleaned with sufficient frequency to ensure all animals the freedom to avoid contact with excreta, or as often as necessary to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests, and odors. There was saw dust used as bedding material in each enclosure holding the chimps. In some cases there was also torn cloth material and old toys, but in each case there was an odor associated with urine, feces or both. The odor was not excessively strong indicating to me that the waste material was most likely

There was dried food on the inside of the metal mesh doors to each enclosure inside this converted motor home. This indicated to me that there was also uneaten food somewhere in the saw dust. The bedding material inside the converted motor home needs to be removed and changed more often in order to reduce disease hazards and odors.

Every person subject to the Animal Welfare regulations (9 CFR parts 1, 2, and 3) maintaining nonhuman primates must have enough employees to carry out the level of husbandry practices and care required in this subpart. The employees who provide husbandry practices and care, or handle nonhuman primates, must be trained and supervised by an individual who has the knowledge, background, and experience in proper husbandry and care of nonhuman primates to supervise others. The employer must be certain that the supervisor can perform to these standards.

At times the licensee accepts opportunities for work out of town. These opportunities may last as long as three to four days. When gone he will not take all of his animals with him so he leaves those that are not taken in the care of his girlfriend. When asked if his girlfriend had any experience or training with exotic animals both of them, he and his girlfriend, freely admitted to, and stated "none".

In approximately November of 2009 James Michael Casey (b)(6) (b)(7)(c)

The neglect comes from the fact that one of the chimps, Hannah, NEVER gets out of her travel cage, gets any exercise or sees the light of day. The five year old, Kenzy, only gets out of his confinement in his travel cage when Mr. Casey has work for him, he also never gets any exercise and rarely sees sunshine. The baby, Bentley, gets out a minimal amount of time each day, gets no play time or exercise time and sees almost no sunshine. The rest of the time he is confined to a "baby crib" that has been modified with a top that locks him in where he can't even stand up. (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) him confined in his little prison for over 18 hours at a time without supervision. When Mr. Casey (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) Bentley is so full of urine and excretion that he has to be immediately bathed.

(b)(6) (b)(7)(c) the two older chimps have LITERALLY NEVER gotten any exercise and are confined to travel cages 24/7. The cages are very small and extremely dark. They have not seen sunlight in the ten months (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) other than when the five year old, Kenzy, is "on a job".

What makes matters worse is that he is lying to the USDA representatives that have done inspections. Mr. Casey calls the USDA, requests a "on the road" inspection, takes the travel truck with his three chimps, checks into a local hotel/motel and waits for the representative to inspect and certify him.

In every case, Mr. Casey (b)(6) (b)(7)(c)  
(b)(6) (b)(7)(c) He has refused to obtain Nevada Driver's Licenses or Nevada Vehicle Registrations in fear that his rouse of "being on the road" would be exposed. By the way this is HIGHLY ILLEGAL in (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) NV.

he would repeatedly physically beat Kenzy. Mr. Casey would use his fist to hit Kenzy on the top of his head, jerk Kenzy's arm EXTREMELY hard to discipline him and even used a stick to keep Kenzy "in line". God forbid if Hannah and Kenzy would talk or yell loudly from their cages. They would be severely disciplined by not feeding them, keeping them in the dark trailer without lights, yelling at them, hitting the cages and/or throwing hot water on them. He didn't want to risk the (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) hearing them; that was one of his greatest fears and he took out the chimpanzee's natural behavior on them and severely punished them for it.

Mr. Casey, I'm CERTAIN that he's squatting on someone's land, lying to the USDA about "being on the road" and keeping his chimps confined in travel cages in virtual darkness, getting no exercise or sunshine. Not once in the time that (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) did the older chimps get out of their cages to simply play or exercise. They were living permanently in a large truck in small cages, most of the time in darkness.

Please consider removing these poor chimpanzees from his custody and the inhumane treatment and place them in a compound where they will be loved, cared for and allowed to live their lives in freedom and not confined to a lifetime jail sentence in a truck in small cages and in total darkness and solitude.

In my opinion Mr. Casey shouldn't be allowed to care for any animals and should be forced into taking anger management classes.

## Complaint: W11-015

Ray, on 12/27/2010 I visited the complainant (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) and had a lengthy conversation about the allegations in his complaint letter of October 14, 2010. He uses strong words such as neglect and abuse in his complaint. When I mentioned that Animal care doesn't have any definitions for the two he got very upset and mentioned that he does go on in his letter and describes the treatment further. In fact he does just that however I feel he describes the neglect and abuse in a way that is showing Mr. Casey is not providing sufficient space and exercise to his animals, all the time, at least initially. (b)(6) (b)(7)(c)

I did not see this type of enclosure.

alleges that when Mr. Casey is out of town

Mr. Casey is in the habit of lying to the USDA in terms of his locations, inspections, and addresses.

Lastly, (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) alleges Mr. Casey has hit his animals with his fist on top of their heads, he would jerk their arms, he would repeatedly beat "Kenzy" for miss behaving, even has poured hot water on them. The list goes on.

I visited Mr. Casey that same afternoon and saw the enclosures (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) spoke of. From previous experience I know that three chimps and one capuchin were housed in what I call a converted motor home owned by Mr. Casey. Hanna a 9 y/o female approx. 70lbs., Kenzy a 5 y/o male approx. 48lbs., Bently a 2 y/o male approx. 17lbs. and one capuchin named Abu that I have no information on other than he is kept in a travel enclosure. I was suspicious of the exact sizes of the enclosures so I took measurements which will follow. The weights were given by Mr. Casey and are approximate.

When I asked who cares for the animals that are not taken on the jobs when he has to go out of town Mr. Casey replied "my girlfriend". The only name I got for his girlfriend was (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) questioned further, asking how much experience (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) had with exotic animals, specifically chimpanzees and he said none. The woman identified as (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) confirmed the response.

As the interview continued I asked how the animals got their daily exercise. Mr. Casey stated he has the use of an enclosure at a location in Las Vegas NV. The enclosure measured ~20feet x 65feet x 7 ½ high. This is an enclosure that has been used by an owner of large felids in years past. There are no partitions in the 65 foot length of the enclosure, no safety devices, i.e., double doors etc., or safety pens/areas for a means of separation.

In terms of exercise: Mr. Casey stated that

Hanna would be paired with Bently for about 2 hours, then

Hanna would be paired with Kenzy for about 2 hours, then

Bently would be paired with Kenzy for about 2 hours.

Apparently Bently cannot be paired with Hanna for any length of time without having supervision. Keep in mind Hanna is the 9 y/o female and Bently is a 2 y/o male.

There was nothing said about Abu the capuchin.

He has requested an application for making this his permanent location in Nevada however has not submitted that paperwork.

Mr. Casey also stated his out of town trips don't last any longer than 5 days.

Mr. Casey is hopeful of purchasing a facility in northern CA suitable for his purpose which remains to be seen.

(b)(6) (b)(7)(c) is doubtful Mr. Casey is truthful with any of the statements given to USDA.

1/03/2011 I have spoken with the owners of the facility in CA and learned there have been only conversations between realtors and that nothing has been entertained in terms of any purchase offers.

In addition to the, what I consider occasional use, of the outdoor enclosure already mentioned Mr. Casey also uses a converted motor home parked nearby. There are a total of three enclosures inside the vehicle.

The first would be just behind the bulkhead on the driver's side. That enclosure measures 81.5 inches x 44.5 inches. This gives approximately 25.19 square feet of floor space. The height of this enclosure measured 81.5 inches.

The second enclosure is just behind the bulkhead on the passenger's side of the vehicle. That enclosure measures 54 inches x 37.5 inches, giving a total of 14.06 square feet of floor space. The height of this enclosure is 61 inches.

The third enclosure is located in the rear of the vehicle. This space measures 49 inches x 85 inches giving just under 29 square feet of floor space total. However this enclosure has the capability of being divided into half which Mr. Casey does most of the time. On those occasions the smaller enclosures yield approximately 14.26 square feet each. The height on both sides is the same at 84 inches.

From my conversations with Mr. Casey he states when he puts his animals in their enclosures they are rotated so they don't always stay in the same space all the time.

The requirements are that all chimpanzees no matter what age be housed in enclosures that have a minimum floor area/animal of 25.1 square feet with a minimum height of 84 inches. I don't feel this vehicle should be allowed as adequate housing for these animals.

The other items for the holding/housing accommodations within the converted motor home to be considered are that there are no provisions for environmental enrichment for these animals to express their species-typical activities. Mr. Casey states that he provides toys etc. to the animals, which he does, however they are not rotated or taken out when destroyed by the animals. I feel Mr. Casey fails here. As far as the Capuchin goes I have seen nothing in the PWB that gives exemption to house this animal alone/by itself. I will be following up with Mr. Casey's veterinarian to see just what he/she has instructed or agreed to.

The complainant has contacted me once again, two days ago, so I feel the need to speak with him again before closing this complaint. More will follow.

One morning the week of 1/17/2011 I took a call from the complainant wanting to know how the complaint was coming along. I told him as with all complaints it is progressing and that to cover all the components of the complaint it takes time and that he would have to be patient.

On 1/24/2011 I traveled to Las Vegas for other routine work and to finish up looking into this complaint. When I looked into my e-mail on the morning of 1/25 I noticed another complaint directed at Mr. Casey by another person/entity this time albeit the allegations are much the same. The responses to those will be on a separate complaint. I have also called the (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) listed as Mr. Casey's (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) of record in an attempt to have a conversation with (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) about Mr. Casey and his primates.

On 1/26/2011 Dr. Randy Ridenour, APHIS A/C VMO and I went to see (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) DVM., PhD. who is the (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) for Mr. Casey. (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) mentioned (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) had seen the two younger chimps but had not seen Hanna the older one. I'm not sure why (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) did say the two younger ones were in good health and (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) was ok with the vehicle they were transported in. I'm not sure which one of the two vehicles Mr. Casey owns he used to take them to this visit to the vet. (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) has an extensive background with chimpanzees while working toward (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) I was troubled with one thing however and that was (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) started to mention (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) visits to Mr. Casey's facility and wasn't sure if (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) had the right to go there. At that

point I told (b) (b) if he refused to let (b) (b) on to the premises (b) (b) is to let me know. I'll double check the PVC again on my next visit to see if the frequency of visits has been addressed at that location.

On 1/27/2011 (b)(6) (b)(7)(c) and I attempted an unannounced inspection at the Las Vegas location Mr. Casey has given and found him or his girlfriend/fiancé not there. I later prepared an inspection report and cited him for access.

In addition to the 1/27/2011 attempted inspection report I also prepared an inspection report from my visit with Mr. Casey on 12/27/2010 at the location in Las Vegas, NV. There were several attempts to send the report to Mr. Casey via the e-mail address he gave me with no success. However, on 2/01/2011 he replied to me that he finally received the report.

Yesterday, 1/08/2011, I had a brief telephone conversation with Mr. Casey to which he told me there were a couple of issues he wanted to raise that were mentioned on the report. I listened to what he had to say then politely told him to write his concerns to the Regional office with the details he had just mentioned to me. He said he was going to do just that.

\*\*\*\*At this point from what has been alleged and what Mr. Casey told me in terms of his handling of his own animals, his past history of "access", and the fact that there is no one with the knowledge, background, or training required per regulation while he away and the very limited space he gives his animals (chimps) when they are in their shelter enclosures not exercising. I FEEL THERE ENOUGH DOCUMENTED THROUGH THE REGIONAL OFFICE AND INSPECTION REPORTS TO REQUEST A FORMAL INVESTIGATION THROUGH I.E.S. OF MR. CASEY.
