



ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

(b) Each dealer or exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include: (1) The availability of appropriate facilities, personnel, equipment, and services to comply with the provisions of this subchapter.

***Several expired bottles of antibiotics were observed in the medication storage cabinet used for the animals. The expiration dates were 2006 and 2007. The safety and efficacy of these drugs may be compromised due to the extended expiration dates on each. The drugs should be discarded in order to protect the health of the animals.



OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

d) Perimeter fence. On and after February 15, 1994, an outdoor housing facility must be enclosed by a fence that is of sufficient height to keep unwanted species out. Fences less than 6 feet high must be approved by the Administrator. The fence must be constructed so that it protects nonhuman primates by restricting unauthorized humans, and animals the size of dogs, skunks, and raccoons from going through it or under it and having contact with the nonhuman primates. It must be of sufficient distance from the outside wall or fence of the primary enclosure to prevent physical contact between animals inside the enclosure and outside the perimeter fence. Such fences less than 3 feet in distance from the primary enclosure must be approved by the Administrator.


***There are several areas along the perimeter fence that are in a state of disrepair. The area along the North side of the fence is broken and crushed in several areas rendering it in a state of severe disrepair. There are also areas along the East side of the perimeter fence that are being crushed by tree limbs and causing the fence to cave in on itself. There are also several areas of extreme rust along the East side of the perimeter fence. The fence should be repaired and/or replaced in an effort to protect the nonhuman primates by restricting unauthorized humans, and animals the size of dogs, skunks, and raccoons from going through it or under it and having contact with the nonhuman primates.

PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

Primary enclosures for nonhuman primates must meet the following minimum requirements: (a) General requirements. (1) Primary enclosures must be designed and constructed of suitable materials so that they are structurally sound for the species of nonhuman primates contained in them. They must be kept in good repair.

***The enclosure that houses the two capuchins and guenon has multiple metal feeders that are flaking and rusted. The rusted metal is located on the inside of the feeders and pieces of rusted metal are flaking off and falling to the bottom of the feeders where the primates have access. The applicant stated that the feeders are not currently being used. The feeders need to be removed or repaired in order to protect the health and well-being of the animals housed within.

Primary enclosures for nonhuman primates must meet the following minimum requirements: (a) General requirements. (2) Primary enclosures must be constructed and maintained so that they:

- (i) Have no sharp points or edges that could injure the nonhuman primates.

***The enclosure that houses "Bo" and "Robin" has sharp wire points sticking up on the outside portion of the fencing located along the west side. In addition, the enclosure that houses "Venny" also has sharp points sticking out from the fence along the west side of the sleeper portion of the enclosure. The metal frame that allows "Venny" access to the sleeper portion of his enclosure has a significant amount of rust along the top edge. The metal frame is also flaking due to the rust. Also, the enclosure that houses "Laverna" has sharp points sticking up along the front gate of her enclosure. The sharp points as well as the metal frame need to be repaired in an effort to protect the health and well-being of the animals.

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

(d) Perimeter fence. On or after May 17, 2000, all outdoor housing facilities (i.e., facilities not entirely indoors) must be enclosed by a perimeter fence that is of sufficient height to keep animals and unauthorized persons out. Fences less than 8 feet high for potentially dangerous animals, such as, but not limited to, large felines (e.g., lions, tigers, leopards, cougars, etc.), bears, wolves, rhinoceros, and elephants, or less than 6 feet high for other animals must be approved in writing by the Administrator. The fence must be constructed so that it protects the animals in the facility by restricting animals and unauthorized persons from going through it or under it and having contact with the animals in the facility, and so that it can function as a secondary containment system for the animals in the facility. It must be of sufficient distance from the outside of the primary enclosure to prevent physical contact between animals inside the enclosure and animals or persons outside the perimeter fence. Such fences less than 3 feet in distance from the primary enclosure must be approved in writing by the Administrator.

***There are several areas along the perimeter fence that are in a state of disrepair. The area along the North side of the fence is broken and crushed in several areas rendering it in a state of severe disrepair. There are also areas along the East side of the perimeter fence that are being crushed by tree limbs and causing the fence to cave in on itself. There are also several areas of extreme rust along the East side of the perimeter fence. The fence should be repaired and/or replaced in an effort to protect the adult bear by restricting unauthorized humans, and animals the size of dogs, skunks, and raccoons from going through it or under it and having contact with the animal.
