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



This facility was inspected on 9/18/07 regarding this complaint. Indeed, a capuchin and vervet are housed together in an enclosure located within a large exhibit housing a few alligators. The pond where the alligators normally stay is quite a distance from the primate enclosure. According to the owner, the alligators rarely come up on shore, and when they do, they usually stay near the edge of the pond. During the inspection, all alligators were in the pond and did not approach the primate enclosure. The primate enclosure is quite tall and would easily allow the primates to move to high perches if they were bothered by the alligators. From the pictures supplied by the complainant, both primates remain on the ground and do not seem agitated by the nearby alligator. Given this, this does not seem to be a violation of AWA regulations.

Social grouping – The primate are not housed with alligators in the same enclosure, so this does not apply.

Primary enclosure – Alligators may not enter the primate enclosure, nor can they injure the primates inside.

Handling – This does not apply since no humans are handling the primates in this instance.

I did discuss this situation with the owner, and while it may not be a violation, it is not a desirable situation. They informed me that they plan to renovate this exhibit over the winter anyway and will add a barrier so that the alligators may not get near the primates.

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

Please consider this letter an official request for the USDA to investigate the following situation at the **Tregembo Animal Park in Wilmington, N.C., license #55-C-0183.**

The enclosed photographs were taken on Thursday, August 30, 2007. As you can see, the brown capuchin and vervet monkeys share an enclosure which is located inside the alligator's enclosure. According to the person who took the photos, both primates seemed distressed when an alligator moved to within several feet of their cage.

This situation would appear to violate the minimum standards of the Animal Welfare Act, specifically the following:

§Sec. 3.81(a)(3) Social Grouping: Nonhuman primates may not be housed with other species of primates or animals unless they are compatible, do not prevent access to food, water, or shelter by individual animals. and are not known to be hazardous to the health and well-being of each other.

§Sec. 3.80 Primary enclosures: (a)(2) Primary enclosures must be constructed and maintained so that they (ii) Protect the nonhuman primates from injury; and (iv) Keep other unwanted animals from entering the enclosure or having physical contact with the nonhuman primates.

§2.131(a)(1) Handling of Animals: Handling of all animals shall be done as expeditiously and carefully as possible in a manner that does not cause trauma, overheating, excessive cooling, behavioral stress, physical harm, or unnecessary discomfort.

Dr. Goldentyer,

Greetings! I hope this letter finds you doing well in every way.

The reason I am writing to you is out of concern for some of the animals at the "Lynwood Zoo".

We had driven by the sign many times but had not stopped in, because the only sign we ever saw was a hand-painted sign, roughly the size of a street sign, along the highway between Jacksonville, NC and Richlands, NC. We figured if the zoo was worth visiting, we would have seen some sort of advertising or a bigger sign or heard something.

But on Saturday, March 28th, we arrived at the zoo. When we first pulled in to the zoo grounds, we saw the zoo's old, run down-looking singlewide trailer and a homemade ticket booth. There was a sign on the ticket booth that mentioned that the cashier is somewhere in the zoo and to find them in order to pay them. So we had to figure out who the cashier was. He was a very pleasant gentleman.

The zoo itself is located in the woods. It is rather marshy back there. While that could be a good concept and makes for a more pleasant walk on a hot day, the condition of the animals is what concerns me most. And there are some endangered species being kept back there as well (they had a few signs that mentioned that certain animals were endangered species).

Many of the animals we observed were standing a few inches high in blackish swamp-like mud. One animal (looked like a Shetland pony from far away, but we couldn't see the sign) was laying in this mud and had nowhere else to lay down and no place for shelter.

The zebra was standing in mud a few inches high and refused to move...where could he go? He was in an enclosure that only provided mud for him to stand in. The (b)(6) (b)(6) said that they are planning on buying another zebra and mating them so they can have babies. Oh please have mercy. It is bad enough that one poor zebra is living like this...let alone a mommy and babies!

Many of the animals had food thrown directly into the mud (even those that had bowls provided for them).

MAY 13 2009

The Weeper Capuchin monkey is missing many of its fingers due to frost bite. This is an animal that is native to hot climates. All this zoo provides is a small enclosure out in the open in the woods, in temperatures that were dropping into the teens (some nights) this past winter. The monkey's fingers got such severe frostbite that the monkey ended up having to chew its fingers off. This only just happened this past winter [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] She told us that the monkey was given a little tiny heater in the back of the cheaply-made enclosure, but that the monkey did not keep its hands up to the heater like it should have, and that's why its fingers froze so severely that the flesh died and the monkey had to bite its fingers off. Even though it supposedly happened a few months before we came to the redneck Linwood Zoo, we and other zoo patrons, observed that the nubs where the fingers used to be were still reddish and "fleshy" looking.

The donkey is in an enclosure roughly 50 feet by 50 feet. You would ordinarily think that would give the poor thing some room. BUT: the whole enclosure is taken up by a gigantic root system from a tree, which prevents the donkey from being able to roam more freely about. The donkey had massive amounts of dung in his or her pen. It had not been cleaned out in some time (if ever). We observed that someone had taken a rake and tried to rake the dung flatter instead of in so many piles, but there were still many piles of dung and the donkey had to stand in it in order to eat its food. In fact, the food bowl was surrounded by it. The donkey just stood there, its poor head sticking out of a hole in the poorly constructed fence.

Other animals, like the baby goats, were in an enclosure that failed to keep them inside. They kept walking through the pen and into the woods. We tried to notify "zoo staff" [REDACTED] but were told that the goats always get out and they just let them roam, rather than provide a properly-fitting fence.

All of the larger animals pretty much were lying in swampy mud. The lucky ones got to lie in dirt. We did not observe overhead shelter on the cages to protect the animals from the usual torrential downpours we get here in North Carolina, or from hurricanes or tropical storms.

Some of the roughly-made habitats were positioned in slightly upward positions, ensuring that the rain would run directly INTO the "habitat".

The shelters that do exist consist mainly of old plastic doghouses. Or scrap wood over an old tin wash bucket in one case, or improvised scrap wood.

The animals overall seemed uncared for and depressed.

There were turkeys labeled as "pheasants", even though they were definitely turkeys and were even making gobbling sounds.

Some of the animals had water that was so dirty and down so deeply in the tin bucket that they could not reach it. There were hoses left out and I was trying to find where the water supply was located so I could turn on the hose and fill up the water myself, but I could not locate it.

MAY 14 2009

When we asked what they were going to do for the animals that are standing a few inches high in swampy mud, we were told that they bring in sand from time to time to mix into the mud. They were about to bring some in that next week or so.

Since they spend SO LITTLE money on properly caring for the animals, they could never hope to afford to bring in enough sand to take care of the mud problem. There are hoof diseases that these animals could get standing in nothing but mud all the time.

A number of the cages are empty. This makes one wonder if they are taking in animals and then the animals are dying under their "care".

The owl sits on a perch but does not have room to fly in order to "hunt".

It is a very sad situation all the way around.

When I asked the few questions that I did, and remarked that they are lucky that no one like Peta comes in there and saw some of the living conditions, [REDACTED] obviously went and told someone that I was asking questions and had taken some pictures on my cell phone, because shortly thereafter, we were followed through the little Linwood Zoo and there was never a time that we were not allowed to be without an employee watching us closely and standing a few feet away from us. There was even a little old lady in a motorized wheelchair that was with them (I am assuming this is a generational family "zoo business"). She sat, glaring at us as we left and watched us get into our van and drive away. All this for asking the [REDACTED] a few questions about the animals' care and for taking a few pictures of some really bad living conditions? God only knows what these people might do if they knew where we live. I do not want intimidation tactics used on our family here at home like we experienced at the "zoo".

I did contact PETA, but a few weeks went by before the gal there [REDACTED] got back in touch with me. By that time, I figured they did not care and nothing would be done and I had deleted the pictures off my cell phone just a day or so before she finally returned my call. They were the only ones I knew of that were concerned with animal's rights and welfare. I was told by [REDACTED] that I was to contact you directly by mail, not by e-mail. She provided me with your mailing address.

This zoo was inspected on April 8, 2009. Response to items in complaint are as follows:

- 1. Muddy conditions – This zoo is in a low-lying area and tends to be muddy after heavy rains. The animals do at least have some high ground in each enclosure. The zebra's pen does tend to be the worst, but the licensee has recently put in a concrete pad to give more dry space and help wear down the hooves.**
- 2. The capuchin monkey was recently acquired and arrived with some frostbite damage to his fingers. The enclosure does have a shelter with a heater. Licensee did say that one night this winter, the power did go out, which may have exacerbated the problem. Power was restored quickly**
- 3. The donkey is not a covered species.**
- 4. A few of the baby goats are allowed to wander within the perimeter fence. They do not go outside the perimeter.**
- 5. All the animals have shelter. Although it is not fancy, it does provide protection from the elements.**
- 6. The animals receive daily care. I did not see any that looked "depressed".**
- 7. All animals have potable water.**
- 8. Deaths at this facility are few.**
- 9. Owls are not a covered species.**

I did note other noncompliances at the zoo (overgrown hooves on blackbuck, some maintenance items) which will be addressed at the next inspection.



I received a message from the NC Zoo that a woman had called to complain about conditions at a private zoo. I contacted her by phone on July 1. Her name was (b)(6) and she stated she had recently been to the Lynnwood Park Zoo in Jacksonville, NC and that conditions were “disgusting”. I asked her to be more specific and she told me that the zebra and llamas had no shelter at all, that there were feces all over the ground in the zebra pen, and that a small exotic cat had no water, and had feces and rotten meat all over its platform. She also said the grass and trees were overgrown and that all the cages looked like they were about to fall over.

I inspected the zoo on July 8 and did find some problems, although they were mostly not the ones mentioned by the complainant. The zebra and llamas each have an adequate shelter in plain view. There were feces on the ground in the zebra pen, but they were not too bad. This pen has been a chronic problem since it does not drain very well and the ground is often muddy. The owner has been working to improve this, but it still needs work. I did ask the owner to have the zebra’s feet checked to see if there were any problems due to the muddy conditions and he agreed to do so. I will monitor this pen on future inspections, and if it does not keep improving, it may eventually be cited. I believe the small exotic cat was the serval. There were no excessive feces seen. It did have one chicken quarter on its platform from the morning’s feeding which it had not eaten yet. I did find some pens in need of maintenance, which were cited.

I did cite some other problems, one of which is a second repeat (single housed primate) for which I am requesting a 7060. (See Enforcement Action Form) Although the owner is cooperative and tries to comply, I think the facility is beginning to deteriorate due to lack of funds.

Concrete that is not sealed cannot be sanitized appropriately. It allows feces, urine, and food waste to be absorbed into the porous surface and increases the risk of disease transmission. The floor must be resealed or replaced. This affects one animal.

3.75 (c) (3) **REPEAT**

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(c) (3) Cleaning. Hard surfaces with which nonhuman primates come in contact must be spot-cleaned daily and sanitized in accordance with §3.84 of this subpart to prevent accumulation of excreta or disease hazards.

***The rhesus, pig tailed, and snow macaques?, brown and ringed tailed lemurs, and capuchin cannot be easily blocked out of their den boxes according to the owner and because of this the den areas are not cleaned often. We were only able to peek into the ring tailed lemur?s den box and found the wooden floor stained with dirt and scent marking oils. The only inside perch for the mandrill has several piles of dried feces on it making it difficult for the animal to lay down with out getting contaminated. There are at least two large piles of feces in the baboon ?Monk?s? enclosure. The den area for the chimp had a pile approximately 3 feet long and 2 feet wide of decaying food and feces. Both enclosures of snow macaques have feces in their den barrels, on the perches, and several piles of feces and decaying food on the floor of the enclosures. This affects 19 animals.

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

(b) Shelter from the elements. Outdoor housing facilities for nonhuman primates must provide adequate shelter from the elements at all times. It must provide protection from the sun, rain, snow, wind, and cold, and from any weather conditions that may occur. The shelter must safely provide heat to the nonhuman primates to prevent the ambient temperature from falling below 45 °F (7.2 °C), except as directed by the attending veterinarian and in accordance with generally accepted professional and husbandry practices.

***The den areas for the snow macaques are large black plastic barrels. Both barrels are suspended from the roof of the enclosures. One barrel is open on both ends and suspended near the rear of the enclosure with a heat lamp at one end. The other barrel is suspended in the middle of the enclosure with no heat lamp. When the ring tail lemur den box was opened the inspector felt only a minimal amount of heat coming from that lamp through the thick board with holes. Because there are no shift or lock out areas, the majority of primate den areas could not be opened to check the temperatures. The den box openings for the spider and capuchin monkeys are large openings with no flaps to contain heat. The temperature on the back wall of the capuchin monkey den box beside the heat lamp was 58 degrees during the highest outside temperatures of the day of 49 degrees. Temperatures for the past month have been average high of 50 and average low of 29 degrees. Twenty four of the last 34 days temperatures were below freezing, including the previous eight days. Open ended den boxes, dens with large door openings or doors with no flaps cannot maintain the needed 45 degree minimum temperature. Necessary changes to the design of these den areas must be made to ensure adequate temperatures are being achieved. These changes could include different

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heat sources, door flaps, and reducing den door sizes. This affects all non-human primates except those with enclosed dens and space heaters such as the chimpanzee and baboons. Temperatures in all den areas should be monitored to ensure minimum temperatures are achieved. This affects 15 animals. To be corrected by: 20 Feb 2010.

3.81 (a) REPEAT

ENVIRONMENT ENHANCEMENT TO PROMOTE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING.

(a) Exhibitors must develop, document, and follow an appropriate plan for environment enhancement adequate to promote the psychological well-being of nonhuman primates. The plan must be in accordance with the currently accepted professional standards as cited in appropriate professional journals or reference guides, and as directed by the attending veterinarian. This plan must be made available to APHIS upon request.

The plan, at a minimum, must address: Social grouping. The environment enhancement plan must include specific provisions to address the social needs of nonhuman primates of species known to exist in social groups in nature. Such specific provisions must be in accordance with currently accepted professional standards, as cited in appropriate professional journals or reference guides, and as directed by the attending veterinarian.

***Eight of the 19 non-human primates at this facility are single housed, including a chimpanzee, a spider monkey, a capuchin, a macaque, a mandrill, two baboons, and a ring tail lemur. The enrichment program does not indicate the history of these primates nor what, if any, attempts have been made to socialize them with other primates of the same or different species. The enrichment program needs to document what efforts are made to meet the social needs of these primates. If they cannot be socialized, than other means need to be used to provide for their social needs.




ENVIRONMENT ENHANCEMENT TO PROMOTE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING.

(b) Environmental enrichment. The physical environment in the primary enclosures must be enriched by providing means of expressing noninjurious species-typical activities. Species differences should be considered when determining the type or methods of enrichment. Examples of environmental enrichments include providing perches, swings, mirrors, and other increased cage complexities; providing objects to manipulate; varied food items; using foraging or task-oriented feeding methods; and providing interaction with the care giver or other familiar and knowledgeable person consistent with personnel safety precautions.

***The environmental enrichment program is not being followed as written. Attention is not being paid to the need for species specific furniture in several cages. The mandrill has one appropriate shelf in the indoor heated cage area, but only one 4 X 4 horizontal post and one inclined wide board in the outside enclosure. The baboon in the middle cage has no cage furniture in the heated cage area (meaning it sleeps on the concrete floor which had a surface temperature of 42 degrees Fahrenheit during this inspection). The baboon on the far right has a fire hose and one 4 X 4 post in the outdoor enclosure. Although 4 X 4 post are good for climbing, they do not provide adequate surface area for these baboon species to comfortable rest off of the concrete floor. Furniture for climbing, resting, or brachiating is inadequate in the majority of cages.

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




A sufficient number of adequately trained employees shall be utilized to maintain the professionally acceptable level of husbandry practices set forth in this subpart. Such practices shall be under a supervisor who has a background in animal care.

***There is one full time employee/family member for this facility. Both owners have full time jobs outside the facility. This is a facility that maintains 45 regulated species, approximately 300 animals on 40 acres, and approximately 15 enclosures of non-regulated species, which include birds and reptiles. This is an impossible task for only one full time employee and 2-3 part time employees to maintain all aspects of husbandry adequately. This is reflected in the repeat sanitation and structural non-compliances. This affects approximately 250 animals. To be corrected by: 8 Mar 2010

A current copy of the Animal Welfare Act as well as a CDs with enrichment articles and ideas was given to the owner during the inspection.

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***Although a few new enrichment ideas were tried after the last inspection, and enrichment items are in the kitchen area, only two new enrichment items were seen in two cages. The two new items do not appear to be used, but they are not rotated to try in another primates cage. During this inspection, most of the cages do not have a single item of manipulanda in them. Most of the food is not being provided in a way to encourage foraging. The licensee has a notebook of enrichment ideas but these ideas are not being incorporated into daily husbandry for the primates. Because the facility is closed for the season, the primates also do not have the benefit of interaction with the public.

***Each primate enclosure needs to be evaluated and appropriate furniture provided to allow for species specific postures. Manipulanda and foraging activities need to be provided on a routine basis to enrich their environment.

3.81 (c) (2) REPEAT
ENVIRONMENT ENHANCEMENT TO PROMOTE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING.

(c)(2) Special considerations. Certain nonhuman primates must be provided special attention regarding enhancement of their environment, based on the needs of the individual species and in accordance with the instructions of the attending veterinarian. Nonhuman primates requiring special attention include those that show signs of being in psychological distress through behavior or appearance.

***The baboon Monk in the far right cage is exhibiting stereotypic behaviors of circling and head tossing. This animals enrichment plan does not acknowledge this behavior, or state what additional enrichment will be provided to try to alleviate this behavior. This baboon needs to be provided additional enrichment.

3.81 (c) (5) REPEAT
ENVIRONMENT ENHANCEMENT TO PROMOTE PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING.

(c)(5) states Special considerations. Certain nonhuman primates must be provided special attention regarding enhancement of their environment, based on the needs of the individual species and in accordance with the instructions of the attending veterinarian. Nonhuman primates requiring special attention include great apes weighing over 110 lbs. (50 kg). Exhibitors must include in the environment enhancement plan special provisions for great apes weighing over 110 lbs. (50 kg), including additional opportunities to express species-typical behavior.

***This licensee has a single housed male chimpanzee. Although his cage is bigger and contains more furniture than the other primates, it does not appear this animal receives any additional enrichment other than what the other primates receive. The enrichment program for this chimp states they spend at least 30 minutes a day with JR doing various activities such as drawing, playing with play dough, grooming, playing with legos, etc. This amount of direct interaction does not appear to be occurring due to lack of employees. Because great apes have greater cognitive abilities, this chimpanzee needs to be regularly provided extra enrichment, including items which stimulate his cognitive abilities.

EMPLOYEES.

Every person subject to the Animal Welfare regulations (9 CFR parts 1, 2, and 3) maintaining nonhuman primates must have enough employees to carry out the level of husbandry practices and care required in this subpart. The

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employees who provide husbandry practices and care, or handle nonhuman primates, must be trained and supervised by an individual who has the knowledge, background, and experience in proper husbandry and care of nonhuman primates to supervise others. The employer must be certain that the supervisor can perform to these standards.

***There is one full time employee/family member for this facility. Both owners have full time jobs outside the facility. This is a facility that maintains 45 regulated species, approximately 300 animals on 40 acres, and approximately 15 enclosures of non-regulated species, which include birds and reptiles. Adequately maintaining all aspects of husbandry and enrichment is an impossible task for the one full time employee and 2-3 part time employees. This is reflected in the repeat cleaning, sanitizing, and enrichment non-compliances at this facility. This affects approximately 19 non-human primates. To be corrected by: 8 Mar 2010

3.125 (a) REPEAT FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(a)Structural strength. The facility must be constructed of such material and of such strength as appropriate for the animals involved. The indoor and outdoor housing facilities shall be structurally sound and shall be maintained in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals.


*** When we arrived at the facility we discovered a goat with its head stuck in the 4 x 4 opening of the fence between the goat enclosure and the camel enclosure. The goat was struggling to remove its head but its horns kept getting caught and prevented release. At that point one of the camels grabbed the head of the goat in its mouth and proceeded to twist and pull. The goat could be heard screaming while this was occurring. The Pyrenees dog housed in the pen with the goats and sheep was observed mounting the goat from behind and grabbing the goat with its front paws and pulling. The owner who was off premises during this was contacted and informed of the situation. He indicated it would be about two hours before he returned. The goat remained trapped in the fence being pestered by the camel and dog on and off two hours. All enclosures must be constructed of appropriate materials to protect the animals from injury. This affects 40 animals.

3.127 (b) REPEAT FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

(b) Shelter from inclement weather. Natural or artificial shelter appropriate to the local climatic conditions for the species concerned shall be provided for all animals kept outdoors to afford them protection and to prevent discomfort to such animals. Individual animals shall be acclimated before they are exposed to the extremes of the individual climate.

***There is a young kangaroo in the enclosure next to the office. This animal did not have any shelter in the enclosure. A den box was placed in the enclosure during the inspection but no bedding was provided. No bedding was seen in any of the shelters for the livestock, exotic hoofstock, exotic mammals, and non-human primates. The past two months have had some of the most severe weather seen in recent history. Temperatures for the past month

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have had an average high of 50 and average low of 29 degrees. Twenty four of the last 34 days had temperatures below freezing, including the previous eight days. There are new born zebu, lambs, and goats as well as singly housed animals. These animals need additional protection from inclement weather to ensure their survival. During times of severe weather additional bedding should be placed in shelter areas to prevent discomfort of the animals. This affects approximately 10 animals.

SPACE REQUIREMENTS.

Enclosures shall be constructed and maintained so as to provide sufficient space to allow each animal to make normal postural and social adjustments with adequate freedom of movement. Inadequate space may be indicated by evidence of malnutrition, poor condition, debility, stress, or abnormal behavior patterns. Animal Health and Husbandry Standards

***This facility has a capybara housed with no access to water. Although this species is not totally aquatic, water is an important aspect to their habitat. Several normal social and postural adjustments are related to the water. Water is an aid to some of the bodily functions of this species. They seek water as a form of refuge when they feel threatened. Access to water is important to this animals health and well-being. This affects one animal. To be corrected by: 1 Mar 2010.

3.131 (a)

SANITATION.

(a) Cleaning of enclosures. Excreta shall be removed from primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent contamination of the animals contained therein and to minimize disease hazards and to reduce odors. When enclosures are cleaned by hosing or flushing, adequate measures shall be taken to protect the animals confined in such enclosures from being directly sprayed with the stream of water or wetted involuntarily.


***The shelter areas for the zebu, fallow deer and adult kangaroos have an excessive build up of feces. Two-thirds of the zebu shelter was covered with deep feces, not giving an adequate area for the five animals to lay down without being contaminated with feces. In the fallow deer barn there was no area without some feces present. The adult kangaroo shelter had an excessive amount of feces present. Shelters must be cleaned often enough to prevent contamination of the animals and prevent disease hazards. This affects 43 animals. To be corrected by: 22 Feb 2010.

SANITATION.

(c) Housekeeping. Premises (buildings and grounds) shall be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the animals from injury and to facilitate the prescribed husbandry practices set forth in this subpart. ***Inside the barn behind the feed storage room there are numerous boxes. On the ground there are rodent poison pellets. In the middle of the area containing the poison pellets are two dead rats that have been there so long they are flat and desiccated. Inside the food storage room there was chemicals stored over open food containers. Inside the

(b) (3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.

***There is a brown and cream colored llama with a large swelling on the left side of its face. The swelling is approximately 4 inches in length, almost the entire length of the jaw, and at one point looks like there is a golf ball under the skin. This swelling was immediately noticed by the inspector but had gone unnoticed by the staff at the facility. There must be a system in place to allow for the observation of the animals on a daily basis to determine if medical issues arise. As issues arise they must be brought to the attention of the attending veterinarian as quickly as possible. The attending veterinarian then should determine the appropriate course of action to be taken. This action will aid in the over-all health and well-being of the animals and ensure suffering does not occur. This affects one animal.


HANDLING OF ANIMALS.

(c)(1) During public exhibition, any animal must be handled so there is minimal risk of harm to the animal and to the public, with sufficient distance and/or barriers between the animal and the general viewing public so as to assure the safety of animals and the public.

***None of the hoof stock have public barriers. There are horned species such as oryx, elk, eland, fallow deer, water buffalo, and black buck maintained at these premises. Lack of public barriers gives the public the possibility for direct contact to these animals. The bull elk came up to the fence during our visit. Considering the visit was during rut and the size of the antlers this animal has there is the potential for a visitor to be injured. Several of the animals came to the fence which would give the public contact a possible injury to the animal or the public. Public barriers such as a secondary fencing system or staff members stationed where they can monitor visitors activities must be put into place. This affects approximately 60 animals.

(d) (2) A responsible, knowledgeable, and readily identifiable employee or attendant must be present at all times during periods of public contact.

***This facility provides feed for the visitors to feed to the animals which is considered public contact. On a typical day there are only 1-2 staff members on hand at the facility. This is an inadequate number of staff members given the geographical size, approximately 40 acres, and layout of the facility to monitor the public activity. This inadequacy is evident by a child being bitten by a zebra on 7 Sep 2009. An adequate number of attendants must be readily available during public contact such as feeding to prevent injury to the public or the animals. This affects approximately 100 animals.

To be corrected by: 30 Nov 2009

FACILITIES, INDOOR.

(b) Ventilation. Indoor housing facilities for guinea pigs or hamsters shall be adequately ventilated to provide for the health and comfort of the animals at all times. Such facilities shall be provided with fresh air either by means of windows, doors, vents, or air conditioning, and shall be ventilated so as to minimize drafts, odors, and moisture condensation. The ambient temperature shall not be allowed to rise above 85 deg. F.

***Upon entering the building housing the rabbits and guinea pigs there was a strong odor of ammonia. Adequate ventilation must be provided to these animals to provide for the health and comfort of the animals. Ventilation can be provided with fresh air through windows, doors, vents, or air conditioning but must be ventilated in a manner to minimize drafts. Temperatures also cannot be allowed to fall below 60 degrees F. This affects eight animals.



***The guinea pig enclosure is wet, has excessive amount of feces, and has a strong smell of ammonia. An excessive accumulation of feces and wet enclosures can cause discomfort and potentially disease in the animals. Enclosures must be cleaned often enough to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and to prevent odors but at a minimum of every two weeks. This affects eight animals.

SANITATION.

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. (1) Primary enclosures shall be kept reasonably free of excreta, hair, cobwebs and other debris by periodic cleaning. ***The enclosure housing the rabbits has excessive amount of excreta built up and has large areas of wet bedding. There are also at least two dead baby rabbits in the enclosure. There is a strong odor of ammonia coming from the enclosure. Enclosures must be cleaned often enough to prevent excessive build up of excreta and to reduce odors but no less than once a week. This affects 5 animals.

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(c) Surfaces (1) General requirements. ***The floor in den area for the mandrill and two baboons is pitted worn concrete. It is eroded in areas showing rock portions of the concrete. Concrete that is pitted and not sealed cannot be sanitized appropriately and allows feces, urine, and food waste to be absorbed into the porous surface and increases the risk of disease transmission. The floor must be resealed or replaced. This affects three animals.

3.75 (c) (3) **REPEAT**

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

(c) (3) Cleaning. Hard surfaces with which nonhuman primates come in contact must be spot-cleaned daily and sanitized in accordance with §3.84 of this subpart to prevent accumulation of excreta or disease hazards.

***The rhesus and pig tailed macaque enclosures have not been clean in a few days. There are several piles of feces both solid and puddles where the rain from the previous day had pounded on it. The staff member indicated it is difficult to clean these enclosures as she cannot get all the animals into the shift cage to allow for proper cleaning. All primate enclosures must be spot cleaned daily to ensure the health and well-being of the animals. This affects four animals.

***There are 19 non-human primates at this facility. Enrichment at this facility appears to be minimal or nonexistent. The enclosures seem to have the same broken large plastic children's toys, a few perches and swings. The mandrill only has a perch in its' enclosure, no other form of enrichment. I have asked to see the enrichment plan and was told it is unavailable. This is the second inspection the facility has been as asked to allow for review of the enrichment program and documentation and it has been unavailable. Some animals such as the rhesus macaque exhibit behaviors such as arm biting. Enrichment must be varied and species appropriate to prevent boredom and potential self trauma. This affects 19 animals.

Water receptacles must be kept clean and sanitized in accordance with methods provided in §3.84(b)(3) of this subpart at least once every 2 weeks or as often as necessary to keep them clean and free from contamination.

***The water bucket for the chimp has algae growing in it. Water receptacles must be kept clean and sanitized to keep them free of contamination. Contaminated water can cause illness. Water buckets must be cleaned more often to prevent contamination. This affects one animal.

***The fence on the end of the eland enclosure closest to the fallow deer pasture has numerous strands of wire that are broken and protruding in to the enclosure. The wire is rusty and sharp creating an injury hazard for the animals. Fencing must be repaired or replaced to ensure the safety of the animals. This affects three animals.

***There is a gap between the fence post/end of fence and the giraffe house. This gap is large enough for an average adult to slide through without difficulty giving them full access to the giraffe enclosure. An individual could enter the giraffe enclosure and potentially injure the animal or become injured by the animal. Enclosures must be adequate to contain the animal and prevent injury. This affects one animal.

FACILITIES, OUTDOOR.

(a) Shelter from sunlight. When sunlight is likely to cause overheating or discomfort of the animals, sufficient shade by natural or artificial means shall be provided to allow all animals kept outdoors to protect themselves from direct sunlight.

***There is a camel, llama, and a sheep housed under the sheltered side of the barn. During the afternoon hours these animals do not have shade. The sheep was observed panting during the inspection. Panting is a sign that the sheep is overheating or suffering some discomfort. An adequate amount of shade must be provided to these animals to prevent overheating or discomfort to the animals. This affects three animals.

Shelter is defined as a structure having four walls and a roof with the fourth wall not completely closed. This affects three animals.







This is an animal of extreme special needs; it is young, housed alone, and cannot see other non-human primates and as such it needs to be provided extra enrichment besides the few broken rattles and baby toys on the ground of its enclosure. The lack of enrichment may be why the animal continues to scratch itself causing scabs. In addition to extra forms of enrichment to be housed with other non-human primates or at least where it can see them would be in this animals best interest. This affects one animal.




I inspected this zoo on April 24, 2008 in response to this complaint. Mr. Faircloth was not present, but I was accompanied by his wife, Herlar. Inspection of the zoo revealed several noncompliances (see report) unrelated to the complaint. This zoo has not had any tigers for about one year, when the last one "Tigger" died. I was told this cat tried to escape its enclosure and hit the electric wire that runs around the top of the cage and that it was found dead. The other tiger died several years ago (2004?) and I don't remember the cause of death. The Faircloths raised these tigers from young juveniles and seemed very attached to them. They currently have no tigers. Given the length of time since the deaths and the nature of the complaint, I do not have any hard proof that the tigers were shot. The lemurs appeared in good condition on their island, which does have long grass, but does not cause a problem.

In talking with Mrs. Faircloth about this issue, she told me that they have been having terrible problems with a woman who had rented a house on their property. This woman is (b)(6) told me is under investigation for unlicensed dealing in primates in Ohio. She apparently did not pay the rent and was evicted recently. I also learned that (b)(6) whom I spoke to on the phone. The complainant also temporarily boarded some monkeys at Little Man's Zoo in the past, but was asked to take them back (per Herlar Faircloth).

While the complaints are old and difficult to prove, there are some problems with conditions at the zoo at this inspection that bear more frequent scrutiny. I will plan more frequent inspections in the near future and have requested in writing that all unexplained deaths be followed up by necropsy.

To Whom It May Concern:

I would like to make a report on a statement that was made in front of me by the owner of a zoo in North Carolina. There were several other people there who heard the conversation which I found very troubling.

He said that he had a tiger that died of "lead poisoning". I was shocked and asked how in the world did a tiger get lead poisoning.....he just grinned.....and then it dawned on two of us standing there that he may have shot the tiger. I asked him "did you shoot it?" and he said yes. He made several references to this "jokingly" on more than one occasion and in front of other people (I was also there when he "told this story").

He had two tigers, both apparently shot by him for no reason. Upon checking with people who were present at the time these killings took place, both tigers were shot, and buried in the woods on the zoo property. There was no vet present at the time the animals were killed although I heard that he did get a vet's certificate after the killings. I don't think the vet was even living in the state of NC when these killings happened. Two of the people there said there was not a vet in attendance.

I know tigers are an endangered species, and thought someone needs to be aware of this. Upon checking on the internet, I found that there is a regulation or law that they cannot be shot, they must be humanly euthanized. Which didn't happen in either case. Mr Faircloth said the one tiger had facial lacerations from the fence and that's why he shot her. He said the other one was getting aggressive and that's why he shot her because he didn't want an aggressive cat in his zoo.

The zoo is called "Little Man's Zoo" in Chadbourne, North Carolina. The owner is Pat Faircloth. He has a nice little zoo, yet there are several things that aren't quite right. It seems as though the lemurs aren't fed very well because they can't get to the island they are on to feed them, so they just throw the food across the water. Some of it falls into the water which the lemurs can't get to. During the summer, their island gets very overgrown due to not being taken care of. Its difficult to even see the lemurs.

I am making this report anonymously due to the seriousness of this situation. There are witnesses to what I have written here. He used his employees to bury the animals. I have a friend who does big cat rescue, and those cats could have been placed in a sanctuary for wild cats, he didn't even try to place them somewhere else. He just shot them.
