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Timberwolves Kill Sandstone Dog

Linda Ziegler says she let her 5-year-old dachshund, Jenny, outside just before noon last Thursday. Ziegler was standing on her front steps when two timberwolves appeared.

"The minute they spotted her, well that was the end," said Linda. "They went right after her and they killed her. And they were carrying her around the yard and there was no one around anywhere. So I was under the impression that these two were wild."

The wolves belong to the Minnesota Wildlife Connection. Founder Lee Greenly says the business provided the animals for a photo shoot near the Ziegler's property when the wolves wandered a little too far.

"I deeply regret that this incident happened and we'll take precautions," said Greenly. "99% of the time it's never a problem. It's just that 1% that happens, and this happened to be a problem."

Linda says she is anxious about going outside after the incident.

"The furthest I can get out the door is to stand on the deck," Linda said. "When I put her out, I have to know where she is every second. And you shouldn't have to do that in your own backyard."

Greenly says he got a dachshund puppy and brought it to the Ziegler's home on Sunday night. He says they were hesitant at first, but they eventually accepted the pup.

"She's cute and she's sweet, but she's not Jenny," said Linda.

Greenly says he has several licenses to breed and raise the wolves, which have been trained by Greenly and his family. He says the regulations for letting wildlife run free in rural areas are minimal.

The Ziegler's say they were unaware wolves were loose in the area. They feel something should be done to make sure this doesn't happen again.

Carlyle Ziegler attended a Sandstone City Council meeting Wednesday night to speak about regulations regarding wild animals being allowed to run loose in the area. Councilors discussed the issue and unanimously passed a resolution prohibiting bringing wildlife into city limits. The resolution will be in place until a formal ordinance can be drawn up.

Country singer pleads guilty in trophy bear case

DULUTH -- Country singer Troy Lee Gentry pleaded guilty this morning in U.S. District Court in Duluth to a misdemeanor charge of falsely registering a trophy bear he killed as wild, when in fact it was a captive bear named "Cubby," which he shot near Sandstone, Minn., in 2004.

As part of a plea agreement that avoided a trial that was to start today, Gentry, 39, agreed to pay a \$15,000 fine, forfeit the bear's hide and the bow he used to shoot the animal and give up hunting, fishing and trapping in Minnesota for five years.

At the same hearing, Gentry's local hunting guide, Lee Marvin Greenly, owner of the Minnesota Wildlife Connection near Sandstone, pleaded guilty to two felony counts of aiding other hunters to kill bears at baiting stations he maintained illegally inside the Sandstone National Wildlife Refuge.

Greenly, 46, faces a maximum prison sentence of five years for each count, a maximum fine of \$400,000 and forfeiture of ATVs he and employees used to reach the bait stations.

In exchange for Gentry's plea, federal prosecutors agreed to drop a felony charge of violating the Lacey Act, which authorities say prohibits possessing or transporting illegally obtained -- or, as in this case, illegally registered -- wildlife.

Gentry, dressed in dark business suit, testified that he bought "Cubby" from Greenly with the understanding that they would stage and videotape a hunt inside the bear's 3-acre enclosure, which is surrounded by an electric fence.

"Lee and I made a deal about harvesting this bear," Gentry testified. He said they also agreed to falsely claim when registering the animal that it was killed in the wild six miles east of Sandstone instead of on Greenly's property south of the town.

Gentry answered with a polite, "Yes, your honor," and "No, your honor," in response to questions from U.S. District Judge Paul Magnuson, who ordered a presentence investigation for both defendants and advised them to appear for sentencing at a date to be announced later, or risk an additional charge.

Gentry declined to comment as he left the courthouse. His attorney, Ron Meshbesh, said his client pleaded guilty to "a simple charge having to do with improper tagging [of a game animal], and that's all it ever was."

Magnuson seemed to make a similar point from the bench, saying that interested parties had sent him "a number of communications that haven't reflected the charge at all...Mr. Gentry didn't tag this bear properly. That's the

charge."

A four-year-old girl from northern Minnesota is recovering tonight after her family says a wolf knocked her to the ground and bit her. This wasn't a wild wolf though. It's domestic, owned by a man who lets people get up close to wildlife for a living.

Four-year-old Johnna Kenowski, known to her family as Johnny Mae, is normally all giggles and smiles. But if you take a closer look at her face, you'll see what she calls her "owies": a scab on her nose, a cut above her eyebrow, and a big scratch on her arm.

Johnny Mae's aunt, Maja Dockal, says she and the girl were walking in Banning State Park near Sandstone Tuesday, when they came across a group photographing a domestic gray wolf and three cubs. Dockal says all of a sudden the adult wolf came up to Johnny Mae then pushed her to the ground and bit her on the head.

A man named Lee Greenly owns the wolves and was able to get the wolf off the girl. Greenly owns Minnesota Wildlife Connection, where people can photograph animals like wolves, bears, and cougars, or have their pictures taken with them.

We spoke with Greenly today, but he declined to talk to us on camera. He says he doesn't know how the girl got hurt, but disputes whether the wolf actually bit her. He says his animals are safe and have never attacked a human before.

The Pine County Sheriff told us today Greenley has the proper licensing for the animals. He said he doesn't consider this incident serious and won't be investigating further.

The facility had 7 bears on inventory at inspection on 11 February 2009. Inspection today noted only 4 bears on inventory at the time of inspection. The facility had not documented the disposition of the 3 animals. In addition, the facility had a bobcat that was present at the inspection on 11 February 2009. Per phone conversation with facility staff the disposition was that the cub had died. However there was no documentation on the current inventory that reflected the disposition of the animal as required.

The facility has failed to maintain records of the animals as required by regulation. This does not allow APHIS Officials to properly track animals as necessary when needed.

Maintain records that fully account for the acquisition and disposition of all animals at the facility.

Correct form this time forward. This affects 4 animals indirectly.

FACILITIES, GENERAL.

Structural strength. The facility must be constructed of such material and of such strength as appropriate for the animals involved. The indoor and outdoor housing facilities shall be structurally sound and shall be maintained in good repair to protect the animals from injury and to contain the animals.

There was a primary enclosure housing 2 wolves that has an area where the wolves had dug and now there is a space that communicates with the outside of the enclosure. This hole leads to the potential of the wolves escaping into the perimeter fence area.

The facility has failed to ensure that the primary enclosure was structurally sound. This unsoundness causes the potential for the animals to escape which can potentially affect the health and wellbeing.

Eliminate the space in the enclosure that communicates to the outside.

Corrected at the time of inspection. This affects 2 animals indirectly.

Inspection and exit interview conducted with Owner.
