Note: **Important Notice*:** Under U.S. code of Federal Regulations 9 Part 91, swine (including pets) are considered livestock and must be inspected by USDA APHIS at the port of embarkation within 48 hours of departure. This is an additional inspection to the inspection performed by the USDA Accredited Veterinarian as listed in statement 14 on the certificate. All pet swine exported to Argentina are permanently prohibited reentry to the United States.***
