# Export Live Animals to South Africa

**For APHIS VMO:** Original ink endorsement **REQUIRED**

USDA-accredited veterinarians can electronically issue health certificates and use VEHCS (Veterinary Export Health Certification System) to submit them to USDA for endorsement.

**USDA must ink-sign and emboss the health certificate.**

What This Means for You

**Animal Owners/Shippers:** You can arrange to have your health certificate returned by mail (a prepaid, preaddressed return label must be provided during certificate submission). The endorsed health certificate—ink-signed and embossed—must accompany the animal(s) during shipment or travel.

### Equine

An import permit must be obtained from the Republic of South Africa, and space must be reserved at the official quarantine station.

### Poultry

Due to the HPAI outbreak, the South African Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development (DALRRD) has imposed trade restrictions on the import of U.S.-origin day-old chicks and hatching eggs from the following States:

- Arizona (effective June 2, 2025)
- Arkansas (effective December 1, 2023)
- California (effective November 7, 2023)
- Colorado (effective January 3, 2024)
- Florida (effective February 22, 2024)
- Illinois (effective February 7, 2025)
- Indiana (effective February 5, 2024)

- Iowa (effective November 2, 2023)
- Kansas (effective January 3, 2024)
- Maryland (effective December 1, 2023)
- Mississippi (effective January 7, 2025)
- Missouri (effective July 1, 2025)
- New Jersey (effective June 6, 2022)
- New Mexico (effective April 26, 2024)
- New York (effective January 3, 2024)
- North Dakota (effective December 1, 2023)
- Ohio (effective December 1, 2023)
- Oregon (effective June 6, 2022)
- Pennsylvania (effective January 10, 2024)
- Puerto Rico (effective January 27, 2025)
- South Dakota (effective March 11, 2022)
- Wisconsin (effective July 1, 2025)

Import permits from the Republic of South Africa are required for live poultry, birds, day-old chicks, and hatching eggs.

Exporters who want to ship livestock or germplasm whose requirements are not listed above should have the importer or buyer in the destination country apply for an import permit at the appropriate ministry. This import permit will most likely outline the specific requirements.
