USDA-accredited veterinarians can electronically issue health certificates and use VEHCS (Veterinary Export Health Certification System) to submit them to USDA for endorsement.

USDA must ink-sign and emboss the health certificate.

Summary of Requirements

All live animals, semen, and embryos that are required to undergo testing for specific animal diseases prior to export may be required by Taiwan law to have both a sample and test date listed on the health certificate.

- Export of Live Birds (older than 72 hours), Day-Old Poultry, Hatching Eggs, and SPF/Fertilized Chicken Eggs originating from HPAI-affected **States** is prohibited, except as described in the *Interim Measures* guidance below.

- Transit of HPAI-affected countries/zones (States) is prohibited, except as described in the Interim Measures guidance below, and for commodities that meet Taiwan's <u>Rules of Import Quarantine Operation for Animal Products</u> <u>Transported by Closed Container</u>.

Exporters who want to ship livestock or germplasm whose requirements are not listed above should have the importer or buyer in the destination country apply for an import permit at the appropriate ministry. This import permit will most likely outline the specific requirements.
