



CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF BIRDS

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Bird(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That there has been no outbreak of New Castle Disease or Avian Influenza (Fowl Plague) in the state or country of origin/export for the last three (3) years.
 - b) That the breeding flock(s) and their parent flock(s) is/are registered and/or officially recognized as being in good standing by the Veterinary Authority of the country of origin.
 - c) That the bird(s) was/were inspected on the day of exportation and showed no clinical signs of infectious diseases.
 - d) That the bird(s) originated from flocks, aviaries, or establishments tested and certified free of Psittacosis; or have undergone forty-five (45) days treatment with Chlortetracycline immediately prior to entry into the territory (otherwise, quarantine and treatment will be carried out upon arrival with associated cost to be borne by owner) or have undergone a period of not less than thirty (30) days quarantine in the country with no clinical manifestation of the disease; or that the state or country is free of clinical psittacosis in pet birds and domestic fowls.
2. The bird(s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.
6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.). It is deemed valid for 30days after the date of issue.**

CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF CATTLE

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) The country of origin has been free of foot and Mouth Disease and other Vesicular Diseases for the past 12 months.
 - b) That animal(s) has/have tested negative for Tuberculosis and Brucellosis within 30 days prior to exportation.
 - c) That the animal(s) were kept for the 20 days prior to shipment in an establishment where no case of anthrax was officially declared during that period
 - d) That the animal(s) was/were treated for internal and external parasites within 14 days prior to exportation
 - e) That the animal(s) is/are clinically healthy with no signs of infectious or contagious diseases and that there has been no reported cases of Rabies (12 months prior to shipment) in the area of origin.
 - f) That the animals originated from a farm frequently visited by a veterinarian and certified to be of acceptable standards.
2. The animal(s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delay in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.

6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.). It is deemed valid for 30days after the date of issue.**

CONDITIONS FOR THE IMPORTATION OF DOGS AND CATS FROM NON RABIES-ENDEMIC COUNTRIES

This includes the following countries:


Antigua, Australia, Anguilla, Barbados, Dominica, Jamaica, Montserrat, New Zealand, Republic of Ireland, St. Kitts, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Virgin Islands, United Kingdom.

1. Animal (s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) The identity of the animal(s): Animals must be permanently identified with a microchip transponder or tattoo.
 - b) That the dog(s) and/or cat(s) is/are healthy and showing no signs of infectious or contagious disease.
 - c) Animal(s) is/are treated against internal and external parasites within 14 days of the scheduled date of travel. Dogs must be negative for heartworm test. *(For ticks: a preparation known to have residual action should be used, e.g. products containing fipronil, amitraz, pyrethrins and permethrins.) The following products are not acceptable: Shampoos, collars and products used for flea control only (e.g. Program®, Advantage®, Revolution® or Sentinel®)*
 - d) The information (including dates) of vaccination of dog(s) against Canine Parvovirus, Distemper, Hepatitis/Adenovirus, Parainfluenza and Leptospirosis
 - e) That the animal (s) is/are vaccinated against Lyme disease in accordance with the manufacturer's data sheet or tested serologically negative for Lyme disease not more than 7 days prior to the date of travel
 - f) The information (including dates) of vaccination of cat(s) against Feline Calicivirus, Panleukopenia, Feline Rhinotracheitis and Feline Leukemia
 - g) That there has been no rabies among un-quarantined animals in the country of origin/export for the past 24 months.
 - h) That the dog(s) / cat(s) has/have been in the country of origin/export for at least six (6) months immediately preceding importation into the territory.
2. Animals must be clinically healthy on arrival.
3. All dog(s) and cat(s) must be spayed or neutered in order to be granted an import permit.
4. Only dog breeds that are **NOT** included in the prohibited breeds list will be granted an import permit

5. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
6. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
7. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was transshipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.
8. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.). It is deemed valid for 30days after the date of issue.**

CONDITIONS FOR THE IMPORTATION OF DOGS AND CATS FROM RABIES-ENDEMIC COUNTRIES

1. Animal (s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) The identity of the animal(s): Animals must be permanently identified with a microchip transponder or tattoo.
 - b) That the dog(s) and/or cat(s) is/are healthy and showing no signs of infectious or contagious disease.
 - c) That the animal(s) is/are treated against internal and external parasites within 14 days of the scheduled date of travel. *(For ticks: a preparation known to have residual action should be used, e.g. products containing fipronil, amitraz, pyrethrins and permethrins.) The following products are not acceptable: Shampoos, collars and products used for flea control only (e.g. Program®, Advantage®, Revolution® or Sentinel®)*
 - d) The information (including dates) of vaccination of dog(s) against Canine Parvovirus, Distemper, Hepatitis/Adenovirus, Parainfluenza, Leptospirosis
 - e) That the animal (s) is/are vaccinated against Lyme disease in accordance with the manufacturer's data sheet or tested serologically negative for Lyme disease not more than 7 days prior to the scheduled date of travel
 - f) The information (including dates) of vaccination of cat(s) against Feline Calicivirus, Panleukopenia, Feline Rhinotracheitis and Feline Leukemia
 - g) That the area of origin is not currently under Rabies quarantine.
 - h) **That the dog(s) / cat(s) has/have being vaccinated against rabies using an approved inactivated adjuvant vaccine administered not less than 6 months and not more than one year prior to shipment. The pet must have been at least 3 months of age at time of vaccination.**
 - i) **That a serological blood test (OIE-FAVN test) has been carried out after vaccination to ensure that a protective level of antibodies against rabies exists. This test must be carried out not less than 3 months and not more than 24 months prior to shipment and the test result must be at least 0.5 IU/ml.**
 - j) That the dog(s) / cat(s) has/have been in the country of origin/export for at least six (6) months immediately preceding importation into the territory.

2. Animals must be clinically healthy on arrival.
3. All dog(s) and cat(s) must be spayed or neutered in order to be granted an import permit.
4. Only dog breeds that are **NOT** included in the prohibited breeds list will be granted an import permit.
5. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
6. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
7. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was transshipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.
8. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.). It is deemed valid for 30days after the date of issue.**

CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF DAY- OLD BIRDS AND HATCHING EGGS FROM AVIAN INFLUENZA AND NEWCASTLE DISEASE FREE COUNTRIES

Whilst chicken is the principal bird considered in this permit, other commercial egg producing species of birds such as duck, goose, guinea fowl, quail, pheasants and turkey are included.

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:


1. The eggs must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating that: -
 - a) That there has been no outbreak of New Castle Disease or Avian Influenza (Fowl Plague) in the state or country of origin/export for the last three (3) years.
 - b) The eggs/birds originated from establishments or hatcheries free from *Salmonella enteritidis* or *Salmonella typhimurium*, Newcastle Disease and Highly Pathogenic Notifiable Avian Influenza and situated in a country, zone or compartment free from Newcastle Disease or Highly Pathogenic Notifiable Avian Influenza.
 - c) The parent flocks of origin for the hatching eggs/day-old birds were not vaccinated against any H5 or H7 subtype of Avian Influenza and Newcastle disease.
 - d) The eggs/day-old birds come from establishments which practise vaccination against Marek's Disease (the nature of the vaccine used and date of vaccination must be stated on the certificate).
 - e) No more than 90 days before the certificate was signed by an **†Official Veterinary Officer** of the Veterinary Authority inspected the flock of origin and found no evidence of communicable diseases of poultry.
 - f) Before leaving the premises of origin, the cases in which the eggs/day-old birds were packed and were sealed with the seal of the **Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin by the Official Veterinary Officer who signed the certificate.
 - g) The certificate identifies the premises and flock(s) of origin and shows the area of origin, the name and address of the exporter, the total number of eggs/day-old birds shipped with the certificate and the date the certificate was signed.
 - h) That the establishments or hatcheries of origin for the processing of eggs, day-old birds and the breeding flock(s) and their parent flock(s) is/are registered and/or officially recognized as being in good standing by the Veterinary Authority of the country of origin.

- i) The shells of the eggs have been rinsed with a hypochlorite solution of 50 ppm to 100 ppm to remove all evidence of faecal, soil and blood contamination prior to packing.
2. The eggs/day-old birds were packed on the premises of origin in previously unused cases.
3. The shipment **MUST** not transit through any regions where Animal Health Services considers Highly Pathogenic Notifiable Avian Influenza to exist.
4. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in the commodity being kept in a facility or destroyed.**
5. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the commodity (ies) at the port of entry.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.). It is deemed valid for 30days after the date of issue.**

+An Official Veterinarian means a veterinarian authorised by and in the full-time employ of the Veterinary Authority to perform animal health and/or public health inspections of commodities.


CONDITIONS FOR THE IMPORTATION OF EQUINE (horse/ donkey / mule) INTO THE TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS

1. Animal (s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That animal(s) has/have been in country of export for at least 60 days preceding export; otherwise the exact time that animal(s) has/have been in that country must be specified and copies of all relevant documents must be presented at port of entry.
 - b) That the horse/donkey/mule is healthy and showing no signs of infectious or contagious disease.
 - c) That the country of origin/export has been free from Vesicular diseases for at least 12 months immediately prior to the date of exportation.
 - d) So far as it has been possible to determine no case of Dourine (Mal de Coit), Mal de Caderas, Glanders (Farcy), Epizootic Lymphangitis, Ulcerative Lymphangitis, Equine Influenza, Equine Infectious Anemia, African Horse Sickness, Equine Encephalomyelitis or Mange has occurred in the premises from which the horse(s) originated or at any place within 15 miles therefore, during 60 days prior to the date of exportation that there have been no cases of Rabies on premises or any place within 15 miles therefore, during 6 months prior to the date of expiration.
 - e) That the horse/donkey/mule has been inoculated against Equine Rhinopneumonitis and Equine influenza.
 - f) That the horse/donkey/mule has been subjected to the Mallien or Complement Fixation test for Glanders Disease, the Coggins test for Equine Infectious Anemia, and Dourine with negative results within 60 days prior to export.
 - g) That the animal(s) has/have been swabbed on three occasions at intervals of 7 days for Contagious Equine Metritis with negative results on each occasion.
 - h) That the horse/donkey/mule has been treated for external and internal parasites within 7 days of export.
 - i) That animal(s) was/were kept in a facility frequently visited by a veterinarian and certified to be acceptable standards.

2. Animals must be clinically healthy on arrival.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 24 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

*** An Official Health Certificate is a document issued and certified by a veterinarian working full time with the Government of the country of origin (e.g. USDA, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, DEFRA, etc.)**

CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF LIVE FISH


The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by an **Aquatic Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That the country, zone or compartment of origin has been free from **Infectious Salmon Anaemia, Epizootic Ulcerative Syndrome, Epizootic Haematopoietic Necrosis, Infectious Haematopoietic Necrosis, Koi Herpes virus Disease, Red Sea Bream Iridoviral Disease, Spring Viraemia of Carp and Viral Haemorrhagic Septicaemia** for the past ten years
 - b) That the facility is currently participating in an ongoing monitoring and surveillance programme recognized by the Veterinary Authority of the exporting country for at least the past **two** years
 - c) That the facilities where the fish are produced are inspected by the Veterinary Authority
 - d) The scientific names of all the aquatic animals in the consignment
 - e) The consignment was inspected by a licensed veterinarian of the exporting country's Veterinary Authority within 72 hours of shipment and found without clinical evidence of disease
 - f) The animal(s) were transported to the place of shipment in specially constructed containers, previously cleansed and disinfected (done to standards implemented by the Veterinary Authority of the exporting country) without coming into contact with other susceptible aquatic animals.
2. The fish must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.

5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal(s).
6. The animal(s) must be kept in the container in which they were shipped until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

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These conditions are subject to changes. Kindly ensure that you obtain an import permit for all animals you wish to bring into the Territory.





CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF SMALL MAMMALS (GUINEA PIGS, HAMSTERS)

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That the animal(s) are captive bred and do not originate from the wild
 - b) That the animal(s) have been kept continuously since birth or for the past six (6) months immediately prior to export in an approved breeding facility which is in a country which has been free of rabies.
 - c) That the animal(s) have been kept continuously since birth or for the past six (6) months in an approved breeding facility which has been free from evidence of the following diseases and disease agents for the past twelve (12) months; **Lymphocytic choriomeningitis, Hanta virus infection, Sendai virus, tularemia and yersiniosis.**
 - d) That no case of monkey pox has occurred in the facility in the preceding six (6) months prior to export.
 - e) That the animals have been treated for external parasites not less than four (4) days and no more than fourteen days prior to export and deemed fit to travel
 - f) The animals are healthy and free from any clinical sign of infectious or contagious disease and external parasites at the time of export and deemed fit to travel.
2. The animal(s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the Port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.

5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.
6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

CONDITIONS FOR THE IMPORTATION OF NON-HUMAN PRIMATES FROM PREMISES UNDER VETERINARY SUPERVISION FOR THE PURPOSES OF ZOOLOGICAL DISPLAY OR EXHIBITION

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating that the animal (s): -
 - a) Are permanently and uniquely identified with a device or method applied in the country of origin using approved humane methods that avoid disease transmission by one of the following methods:
 - i. a tamper-resistant ear tag or devise where applicable for use in the species
 - ii. a unique alpha numeric tattoo in an ear or a body location applicable to the species
 - iii. electronic identification, implanted microchip or a radio frequency identification (RFID) tag.
 - b) Have been examined on the day of shipment and found to be healthy, free from clinical signs of contagious disease, and fit for transport;
 - c) Are or were either born in the premises of origin or have been kept there for no less than 2 years.
 - d) Premises of origin are under permanent veterinary supervision and that there is an ongoing health monitoring programme in place, including microbiological and parasitological tests as well as necropsies;
 - e) Have been kept in buildings and enclosures in which no case of tuberculosis has occurred during the last 2 years prior to shipment;
 - f) Come from premises in which no case of tuberculosis or other zoonoses including rabies has occurred during the last 2 years prior to shipment in the building where the animals were kept;
2. Each animal to be exported must be placed in isolation from other non-human primates not of the same health status for at least thirty (30) days immediately prior to export and during this time must remain free from signs of communicable diseases:-

- a) During the isolation:
- i. The animal (s) to be exported must be tested with negative results for tuberculosis using preferably mammalian old tuberculin (MOT); where not available, the preferred option is the Mantoux test with human PPD (tuberculin purified protein derivative) of the highest possible concentration.
 - ii. For marmosets and tamarins, one test must be administered during the thirty (30) days' isolation prior to export using the abdominal skin as the test site.
 - iii. For other common species, two (2) tests at least two (2) weeks apart must be administered during the thirty (30) days' isolation prior to export using the eyelid as the test site.
 - iv. The animal (s) to be exported must have microbiological faecal culture with negative results for *Salmonella*, *Shigella* and *Yersinia*.
 - v. The animal (s) to be exported must be tested with negative results for endoparasites.
 - vi. The animal (s) to be exported must be treated for endo and ectoparasites using the treatment appropriate to the non-human primate species. Anti-protozoan treatment must also be performed for a minimum of two (2) weeks.
- b) All animal (s) are to be monitored daily and any unusual illness or mortality must be immediately reported to the Veterinary Authority for remedy before export;
- c) Any animal (s) dying for any reason are to be subjected to a complete post-mortem examination at an approved laboratory for this purpose;
- d) Any cause of illness or mortality must be determined before the group to which the animal (s) belongs is released from isolation.
- e) The animal (s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
- 3. All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.

6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.



ADVISORY

NON-HUMAN PRIMATES FROM PREMISES UNDER VETERINARY SUPERVISION FOR THE PURPOSES OF ZOOLOGICAL DISPLAY OR EXHIBITION

The presence in most non-human primates of some zoonotic agents such as measles, hepatitis A, monkey pox, Marburg disease or Ebola is almost inescapable, even after release from isolation and quarantine. Animal Health Services, therefore, seeks to encourage handlers and those exposed to non-human primates or their body fluids, faeces, or tissues to take such personal hygienic steps including the use of protective clothing, prohibition of eating, drinking and smoking (while handling these animals) to preclude potential infections.

There are some viral zoonoses, e.g. Herpes B, for which current diagnostic testing is not reliable. All imported macaques should be considered as infected with Herpes B virus and managed accordingly. For others - for example, other herpes viruses or retroviruses, which can be latent, producing lifelong infections in some species - the diagnosis and exclusion of such infected animals may not be possible for the purposes of importation. The precautions described in the *OIE Terrestrial Animal Health Code*, Chapter 6.11, Article 6.11.7 should be strictly applied when handling such non-human primates in order to protect human health and safety.





CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF PIGS

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That the country of origin is free of Foot and Mouth Disease, Vesicular Stomatitis, Swine Vesicular Disease, African Swine Fever, Hog Cholera and Aujeszky's disease.
 - b) That the area of origin has been free from Rabies, Anthrax, Swine Erysipelas, Atrophic Rhinitis, Transmissible Gastroenteritis and Enteroviral Encephalomyelitis.
 - c) That the pigs were born and raised in the country of origin.
 - d) That the pigs originated from farms free of Tuberculosis and Brucellosis or, have tested negatively within 30 days prior to export and there have been no clinical cases of Leptospirosis on farms during a 90 days period prior to exportation.
 - e) The pigs were treated against internal and external parasites within 14 days of exportation.
 - f) That the pigs were found clinically healthy with no signs of infectious or contagious diseases at or about the day of exportation.
2. The pig (s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the Port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.
6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF RABBITS

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) That the country of origin has been free from Tularemia, Myxomatosis and Viral Haemorrhagic Disease of rabbits for at least one year.
 - b) That there have been no cases of Rabies in the establishment of origin for twelve (12) months prior to shipment.
 - c) That the rabbits originate from establishments that are regularly inspected by the Government Veterinarian and have maintained high standards.
 - d) That the rabbits are born and bred or have been reared for at least twelve months in country from which the animals are exported.
 - e) That animal(s) was/were treated against internal and external parasites (particularly Coccidiosis and ear mange)
 - f) That the rabbit(s) was/were examined and found free from clinical diseases prior to export.
2. The rabbit(s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delays in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.
5. In the event that during the course of transporting the animal, it was trans-shipped via another country and remained there for twenty-four (24) hours and over, a veterinary certificate from the competent authority or from the quarantine Officer must be obtained stating that the said animal(s) did not leave the quarantine area, noting the period of time in quarantine and the condition of the animal.

6. Animal(s) must be kept in confinement (carrier) until granted entry into the territory. Failure to do so can result in entry being denied.

CONDITIONS FOR IMPORTATION OF SMALL RUMINANTS (SHEEP/GOATS)

The following conditions must be met before entry into the territory can be granted:

1. Animal(s) must be accompanied by a **Health Certificate** issued by the ***Veterinary Authority** of the country of origin stating: -
 - a) The country of origin has been free of Foot and Mouth Disease and other Vesicular Diseases, Peste Des Petits Ruminants, Rift Valley Fever, Rinderpest, Sheep Pox, Goat Pox and Blue Tongue (24 months) for the past 36 months.
 - b) That Scrapie has not existed on the premises of origin during the 3 years immediately prior to shipment and that animal(s) is/are not the progeny of a sire or dam that was affected with Scrapie.
 - c) That animal(s) has/have tested negative for Caprine Arthritis Encephalitis or premises of origin are free of Caprine Arthritis Encephalitis.
 - d) That animal(s) has/have tested negative for Tuberculosis and Brucellosis within 30 days prior to exportation.
 - e) That the animal(s) was/were treated for internal and external parasites within 14 days prior to exportation
 - f) That the animal(s) is/are clinically healthy with no signs of infectious or contagious diseases and that there has been no reported cases of Adenomatosis, Nairobi Sheep Disease, Maedi-visna or Rabies (12 months prior to shipment) in the area of origin.
 - g) That the animals originated from a farm frequently visited by a veterinarian and certified to be of acceptable standards.
2. The animal(s) must be found clinically healthy on arrival at the port of entry.
3. **All required conditions must be met, and all relevant documents (import permit, Veterinary Health Certificate, Vaccination Certificate, Laboratory Test results, etc.) must be submitted at the port of entry in order to facilitate Veterinary clearance. Failure to comply can result in animals being kept in a facility, deportation or euthanasia.**
4. The Veterinary Unit must be given at least 48 hrs. notice of confirmed arrival date, time, airline/vessel and port of entry. This is to avoid delay in the clearance of the animal(s) at the port of entry.

5.
