The export of horses, swine and ruminants to Canada is suspended from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Virus affected states, as indicated below (exceptions as noted):

- **Arizona:** effective October 31, 2025. Any animals that have been in the state in the previous 21 days (October 10, 2025 October 31, 2025) are also ineligible for movement to Canada.
- Horses, swine and ruminants in infected VS states will have to be moved to a non-infected state, remain for at least 21 days and be certified by USDA as follows:

 All states in which the animal(s) have resided in the past twenty-one (21) days have been free from clinical and epidemiological evidence of vesicular stomatitis during the twenty-one (21) days immediately prior to export to Canada.

Please note: Interstate animal health requirements may prohibit movement between states without permit/certification/testing/post-entry testing. Exporters should check individual state requirements prior to movement.

• Transiting VS affected states

Whenever possible, U.S. origin and returning Canadian horses, swine and ruminants should avoid travelling through the infected states. If the only route available is through a VS affected state, when the owner/shipper arrives at the Canadian port of entry they must complete a **Supplementary Declaration which must be countersigned by the CFIA Veterinarian**.

Please note: This is an additional requirement. Exporters should contact CFIA (information below) in advance of arrival, regarding the specific requirements for entry.

EXCEPTIONS

• CANADIAN HORSES, SWINE AND RUMINANTS RETURNING TO CANADA will not be able to enter Canada after a stay in a VS infected state in the last 21 days. The exception to this rule is Canadian Animals returning on their Canadian health certificate can do so up to three (3) days* after the state they are in has been declared affected by vesicular stomatitis by USDA and must be inspected by the CFIA POE vet. Otherwise, the Canadian health certificate is null and void.

*Arizona – November 3, 2025

• CFIA PRE-APPROVED EVENTS

The CFIA and USDA have negotiated an option that allows U.S **horses and ruminants** originating from VS affected states and Canadian horses and ruminants to return from VS affected states to attend major competitions/exhibitions. This option is only available to horses and ruminants participating in the following competitions/exhibitions that have been pre-approved by the CFIA (IAB):

- o Royal Winter Fair
- Agribition
- o Calgary Stampede
- o Thunderbirds
- o Spruce Meadows
- o Longines Global Tour
- o Denver Stock Show
- Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo
- Desert International Horse Park Show Series
- US origin and returning Canadian horses and ruminants that qualify for this exception are required to:

1) Obtain a CFIA import permit

2) Obtain a USDA health certificate with the USDA addendum for VS and must be certified by USDA as follows:

The animal(s) for export to Canada must be certified for vesicular stomatitis (VS) as follows:

1) All premises on which the animal(s) has/have resided in the past twenty-one (21) days must have been free from clinical and epidemiological evidence of VS during the twenty-one (21) days immediately prior to movement of the animal(s) off the premises, and this disease has not occurred on any premises within a 25 mile (40 km) radius during the same period of time.

AND

- 3) The animal(s) was/were inspected within the seven (7) days immediately prior to export to Canada and found to be free of clinical signs of VS.

 AND
- 4) The animal(s) was/were protected from insect vectors during the seven (7) days immediately prior to export to Canada and during transport to Canada. AND
- 5) The animal(s) is/are accompanied by a CFIA import permit and the import permit number is recorded on the addendum.
- 3) Be inspected by a CFIA veterinarian at the Canadian port of entry and successfully complete a detailed inspection. An appointment for a veterinary inspection must be made
